TO THE EDITOR OF HASZARD'S GAZETTE. Sir, - As a general rule, I have always thought it best to refrain from replying to anonymous attacks, or personal observations of any kind, and it is only because I know that it is my duty to do so, that I have done so.

I shall therefore, merely give the public, two quotations from a book of some authority called "William John Lawson's History of Banking," the first from page 173 of the Boston edition 1852, and which is as follows: "In Scotland there are no Government Savings Banks, the accumulations of the frugal, are paid into the joint stock banks, and by them, in facilitating commercial operations in the neighbourhood in which the money is collected, amongst these there have been no failures, whilst on the contrary, among the English and Irish Savings Banks, numerous failures have taken place, many of them accompanied with serious and lamentable consequences to the unfortunate depositors."

The second is from page 236. "The second branch of deposits consists of small sums placed in the hands of the banks at interest, which are generally the savings of industrious mechanics, servants, &c., and which are placed in the hands of the banks to accumulate, and on which parties may operate, not in the nature of a current account, but may receive a partial repayment whenever they please."

This branch of their business appears to be an extension of our Savings Bank. The depositors go to the bank half yearly or quarterly, and deposit the savings of their labor, which with the interest that has accrued from their previous deposits is added to the principal. In this way it goes on accumulating, until the sum reaches the amount which the depositor has calculated will be sufficient to effect the object for which the deposit was first begun, and the whole is withdrawn."

This may be all prominently absurd, in the estimation of the courteous and humble minded W. but it is nevertheless stated as fact, in a work written expressly for the purpose of giving information upon banking affairs, and which is highly commended for its accuracy and faithfulness in the London Banker's Magazine.
