## I. C. R. Plans For Campbellton

#### As Now Submitted Will Need Very Little Additional Ground and Are Approved of by Town Council and Citizens.

Campbellton, N. B., August 26. The plans for the erection of the I. C. R. station, freight sheds, machine shop and round house have been received here and at a meeting between Mr. Brady and the Town Council, have been approved and work will be begun at once.

The new plan will require little additional land to provide the necessary space for all the important works. That required will be the lots between the railway and the river except perhaps the McLennan Foundry & Machine Co.'s site.

Two street crossings at least will be done away with. These are the Mowat crossing and the Sugarloaf Street Crossing. Water street will be continued along to the river end of Sugarloaf street, and a subway will be erected from Rosebury St. to Water St.

The new station will be erected on the site of the old shops and Round House, and will be a handsome structure of brick and stone. It will contain all the necessary

offices in connection with the I. C. R. here except the Freight Dept. Spacious walks will be provided about the station which will front on Gerrard and Victoria streets.

The freight sheds will be at or near the location of the old station and will be large and spacious. The shops will be a little further up, while the round house will be at or near the old coal sheds.

The plan as above outlined is very similar to the one submitted by the Board of Trade a little over a year ago, and is perhaps the best which could be devised without the purchase of a large amount of land.

It was the intention of the I. C. R. to purchase some adjoining land on Gerrard street, but property owners asked such exorbitant prices that it was decided to endeavor to get along without it.

The new plan greatly enhances the value of real estate on Victoria and Gerrard streets in the vicinity of the new station.

## Body Recovered After Long Time

Campbellton, N. B., August 26. After being in the water for over a year, the body of Alex Columbe, a steam driver on Christopher Brook, who was drowned in May 1909, was recovered in the Restigouche Boom on Tuesday.

While at his work Mr. Dow Sheals saw something in the mud which he thought might be the body of a man. He called Mr. Donald

McBeath and they pulled the object to the surface, when it proved to be the badly decomposed body of a man. The coroner was notified and took charge of the body.

The supposition is that the body was buried in the sand bank which formed at the mouth of the Christopher Brook a year ago, and which was washed away this spring releasing the body.

## Assisting Town To Resume Work

Campbellton, N. B., August 26. The various companies with which the town of Campbellton has been doing business for many years have been very generous to the corporation and are assisting in rebuilding the electric light plant.

The Canadian General Electric Co. of Toronto, besides donating a large amount of supplies for the street lighting system is loaning free of charge a large generator of the latest pattern for the temporary lighting plant. This generator will be sufficiently large to generate current until the new plant is installed. The street lamps supplied are also of the latest pattern and will

give fifty per cent. more light at thirty three per cent. less operating expense than the old lights.

Chief Electrician Farrah and his assistants are rushing work on the temporary building and the street wiring system. The Lakefield Portland Cement Co. are sending four hundred and fifty barrels of cement for construction work. This cement is free except the usual storage charges at St. John. The Guta Rercha and Rubber Manufacturing Co. have shipped the town 250 feet of their best grade fire hose and a nozzle, free of all cost. The generosity of these companies to the town will no doubt be appreciated by the citizens.

Maltby of Newcastle visited Jacquet River and made a thorough examination of the place. Very stringent measures have been taken to stamp out the disease.

Y., Aug. 21.—Following a hard rider party at the home of Enoch Tompkins at Little Rest, Tompkins entered his house Thursday night and found his house-keeper, Susan Spencer, 70 years of age, sitting with a boarder, James Ferris. Taking down from the rafters a double-barreled shot gun, Tompkins, it is said, shouted: "I'll shoot you both," and pointing the gun at the woman pulled the trigger. The charge tore away part of her neck and she died instantly. He then walked out. He was arrested.

**Problem V. Help**—The old way was to allow men to go on long errands—wade half a morning walking to Smith's, only to find that his horse was already harnessed. The new way is to make the "phone your errand boy—borrow, buy, or sell the "short cut."
