Woman As Old  
As She Looks

But That is All. For in the  
Albania the Natives Have  
No Use For Calendars—  
Judge Distance Only by Time

SCUTARI, Albania, Feb. 13.—Cal-  
endars and clocks are luxuries that  
the peasants of Albania still manage  
to do without, and if they did have  
clocks, as an American remarked,  
"they could not read them."  
The untutored folk of Albania know  
only three periods of time—morning,  
noon and night—and the seasons of  
the year—winter and summer. Days  
and dates are Greek to them. No  
doubt they are a people of the future.  
When a traveller asks an Albanian  
the distance from one point to an-  
other he never answers in miles or  
kilometers, but "it is half a day," or  
"it is two days." When an Albanian  
makes an appointment he is consid-  
ered to have kept it if he comes within  
one or two hours of the time set.

When the American Red Cross doc-  
tors or nurses have a patient, on a  
hard full day, they wish him to eat  
at regular hours, they are almost in  
despair. About the best they can do  
is to tell him to eat at sunrise or sun-  
set. Or if he is a Mohammedan he  
knows the evening meal to pray.

Even in the Albanians did have  
clocks they would hardly know which  
time to keep. Most of the Europeans  
and Americans in Scutari keep Gre-  
gorian time. The French military forces  
have a time of their own, which is an  
hour earlier. The Mohammedan time  
is six hours earlier, and so when the  
Europeans are taking to their beds,  
the Mohammedans have just started  
their afternoon coffee and cigarettes.  
With the absence of calendars the  
people naturally do not know their  
correct time, especially in the country  
districts, and a woman is no older  
than she looks.

## Big Developments in Evangeline's Land

Not only is the Canadian Pacific  
Railway making advances in accom-  
modation with the necessities of the  
times, and providing every modern  
improvement for the convenience  
and comfort of the public, but all  
its subsidiary lines are similarly pro-  
gressive. The Dominion Atlantic  
Railway, which serves a large por-  
tion of Nova Scotia and runs through  
the beautiful land of Evangeline,  
now owns and operates The Pines  
Hotel at Digby, providing first class  
accommodation for the large num-  
bers of tourists who visit the dis-  
trict. A new night service between  
Halifax and Yarmouth has recently  
been inaugurated. This night ser-  
vice leaves Yarmouth on Monday  
evening and Saturday evenings,  
and Halifax on Sundays, Tuesdays,  
and Fridays, and carries one of the  
most important developments since  
the through line of railway from  
Yarmouth to Halifax was opened up  
for traffic in 1917. These trains car-  
rying on a combined freight and pas-

senger service, but only carloads of  
through merchandise are carried.  
When on a trip of inspection over  
the Dominion Atlantic Railway, at  
the end of November last, Mr. Grant  
Hall, vice-president of the C. P. R.,  
expressed the desire to have the  
D.A.R. equipped in the near future  
with steel rails much heavier than  
those at present laid. He said that  
this work would probably be under-  
taken when the effects of war condi-  
tions had disappeared. Important  
improvements are being carried out  
along the line and arrangements are  
progressing for the erection of a  
new station at Digby which will  
provide the most up-to-date facilities  
for tourists and other traffic and  
add considerably to the beauty of  
the town. It is estimated that dur-  
ing 1919, 60,000 tourists visited Nova  
Scotia and spent there about \$3,  
000,000. Recently a new station  
was opened at Bridgetown, much to  
the satisfaction of the public of that  
town. It is a handsome building

24 ft. x 56 ft. with 20 ft. overhanging  
on each end and has in front a lavatory  
walk 300 feet long and 12 feet wide.  
The building is very conveniently  
designed. It has a cement base-  
ment. The outside finish is stucco  
on truss wall, coated with plain  
pebbled dash, with smooth finish  
above and below. The roof is as-  
bestos. The inside consists of gents'  
room, 20 ft. x 24 ft., office 14 ft. x  
14 ft., ladies' waiting room, 22 ft. x  
24 ft., and baggage room 24 ft. x 17 ft.  
The inside finish is of Douglas fir  
and birch, finished in the natural  
wood. The ceilings and side walls  
are sand finish tinted in cream.  
There are also up-to-date conven-  
iences and the heating plant consists  
of a Cumberland hot air furnace  
manufactured and installed by Mr.  
B. E. Banks, of Bridgetown, who also  
executed the plumbing. The inside  
and outside decorating was in charge  
of Mr. Harry Sanction. The whole  
work, including the building of a  
freight shed 30 ft. x 45 ft., on the

opposite side of the track, was built  
by contract by J. H. Hicks & Sons,  
under the personal supervision of  
Mr. E. A. Hicks, of that firm, who  
has already built seven Dominion  
Atlantic Railway stations.  
The Dominion Atlantic Ry. has  
also added to its system the hotel at  
Kentville now known as the "Aber-  
deen." Kentville is an important  
and growing centre, and the fact that  
it is now to have modern hotel ac-  
commodation will add tremendously  
to its benefit.  
The "Aberdeen" is splendidly sit-  
uated, and will be made very at-  
tractive. It will be renovated and  
refurnished from cellar to roof.  
Many of the rooms will be equipped  
with private baths. The work of  
renovation will begin at once, but  
will be so conducted that guests will  
not be disturbed. The Aberdeen  
will continue to be operated the year  
around, and cater to the general and  
commercial interests as well as to  
the tourist traffic.
