

Local and Other Items

The census returns for the Commonwealth of Australia give a total population of 5,419,702, an increase of 964,697 since 1911.

Sir George Foster, Acting Prime Minister, and Minister of Trade and Commerce, has been honored with the degree of LL.D. in absentia by Edinburgh University.

During an electrical storm which passed over Belleville, Ont., last Thursday, Stewart Airhart, a young married farmer, living in Marmora township, just north of the village of Marmora, was struck by lightning and instantly killed while pitching hay in the mow of his barn.

A Toronto despatch says: His Honor Lionel H. Clarke, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, must take an indefinite leave of absence. His illness is deemed so serious that he has to give up for the present, at least, all the duties of his office and take absolute rest. His Honor's illness has been diagnosed as nervous indigestion.

Fire on the 12th completely destroyed the Gilroy-McKay lumber mill at Port Alburnie, E. C., with a loss in plant alone estimated at \$75,000. A million and a half feet of lumber was lost. The Canadian Voyager was berthed at the mill loading 550,000 feet of lumber for Quebec points. Both cargo and vessel were saved.

The long controversy between the U. S. Government and the Western Union Telegraph Company over the landing of its Miami-Barbados cable at Miami, Florida, was brought to an end about a week ago with the granting of Federal permission for the landing, according to word received by the local office of the Western Union.

Restoring sight to the blind by transferring eyes of animals to human beings is not beyond the power of the surgical world, according to Dr. John H. Brinkley, Bridgeport, Conn., who claims to have performed over 800 successful operations. He said recently he expected to perform such an operation within six months.

The schooner Mayflower, built by Boston interests for the fisheries and as a candidate to defend the International Fishing Championship Cup, finished her first trip to Gloucester on the 14th. She arrived from the Banks with her hold full of fish, the result of catches made since her departure the last of April. It was estimated that the Mayflower's catch would amount to 250,500 pounds.

The Port Arthur Ont., News Chronicle states that a meeting is to be held in that city shortly to organize a committee which shall work to the end of organizing a new province in northern Ontario. The paper gives no names but intimates they may be announced later. It says opinion previously was divided as to whether to form a new province or join Manitoba but that opinion now favors a distinct province.

Official Washington on the 15th hunted for the Versailles peace pact. The copy which was brought back by Woodrow Wilson and submitted to and rejected by the Senate, has disappeared. Joseph Tumulty, who was secretary to President Wilson, saw the document last in the White House March 4, when Warren G. Harding took office. Tumulty said he placed the document on the President's desk. Now the pact is missing and no one appears to know what became of it.

A despatch from Modesto, Calif., of the 14th, says: Four men were killed here today in an airplane accident. The left wing of the plane crumpled when it was about 2,600 feet above the ground. The plane caught fire as it fell and within a few minutes was a mass of flames. The machine struck high voltage wires in the fall. The bodies were so badly burned that they were unrecognizable. Three of the bodies were thrown clear of the plane while the fourth was buried in the debris. Spectators declared they believed all four were dead before the machine struck the ground.

Local and Other Items

Right Hon. J. W. Lowther, ex-Speaker of the British House of Commons, will be raised to the peerage as Viscount Ullswater, after a lake of that name in his home district.

Fishermen report a serious condition of affairs in connection with the fish of the Magog river, near Sherbrook, Quebec. Hundreds of dead fish are lining its banks, and a large catch of bass yesterday taken around the Drummond dam showed the fish to be all diseased, and infested with worms.

Canada's share in reparations which Germany is to pay the British Empire has been fixed by the Prime Minister's conference at \$300,000,000. On the decision of the Supreme Allied Council the total German reparations bill placed at \$6,500,000,000 is now roughly speaking thirty billion dollars.

At the Liberal Conservative Convention held at Summerside on last Thursday, Mr. Adrain Arsenault, was chosen as the Candidate to contest the third district for the Legislature in place of Hon. A. E. Arsenault, appointed Judge of the Supreme Court. Much enthusiasm prevailed and lively speeches were made by the Candidate, the Leader of the Opposition and others.

Commencing Monday, June 27, 1921, the following changes will go into effect:
