Crisis Ended.

"The Moroccan crisis is practically ended." So runs a late message from London to-day, and welcome will be the news everywhere. It is pleasing to learn that the difficulties can be overcome by diplomacy, and that the interests though complicated will be adjusted by negotiations, however prolonged. "War is hell," and cannot be welcomed, and can only be resorted to when every other effort has failed. There can be little room for doubt that the political strife in Britain encouraged Germany to believe that Britain was in no position to take a firm stand. Especially did this appear when the unprecedented display of partisan bitterness occurred last Monday night in the House of Commons, but Germany misconstrued the appearance of things. However far British partisanship will go and it has gone outrageously far in connection with the Parliament Bill, there is a limit to it, and that limit was reached when Germany presumed to take advantage of it. Then indeed a change was seen. First of all, the pro-Boer, Quaker-associate, Lloyd George speaks in martial strain to Germany. Next out of partisan chaos, order springs, and Balfour joins Asquith in making plain that Government and Opposition are as one in face of national danger, and even MacDonald cannot brook that the spirit of the nation shall be broken by Germany.

Meling Out Justice.

To-day a drunk was fined \$1.50 or 7 days and another \$1 or 5 days while a third was fined \$2 or 7 days. A fisherman of Logy Bay drunk, and breaking the door and window in Wm. Knowling's house, was fined \$1 or 5 days. Mr. Knowling would not prosecute. Head Const. Peet summoned one and Const. Hutchings three, owners of autos for driving without lights. All pleaded guilty and as the act bearing on the matter provides no penalty there was nothing for the judge to do but to dismiss each case. Daniel O'Connell, the great Irish statesman, reformer and lawyer, frequently said that he could drive a coach and four through the laws enacted in his day. Judging from the acts passed by the renowned split government of Newfoundland one could drive something larger than a coach and four through them. Such stupidity on the part of legislators is disgraceful.

Tourists Complain.

We learn that letters and even telegrams were received to-day from tourists who were here on the Stephano and Floriel complaining of the excessive rates charged these people by our cabmen while they were visiting St. John's. This summer has specially evidenced the fact that our tourist traffic is quickly growing and that a few years hence it will be a valuable asset for the Colony. However if our visitors continue to act so unfairly to strangers arriving here we will soon see a falling off in the number of visitors coming to our shores. The people who have complained for very much aggrieved over the manner in which they have been treated while driving and they are fully determined to air their grievance in the American press. This is a matter which concerns our public and business and should be brought to bear immediately to impel the Municipal Council to meet and arrange for the formation of a just and equitable schedule of fares for our cabmen.

THE Cove reports that Shoe Cove has some traps still doing well; the boats get from 1 to 3 qals. daily. Twillingate—Traps 2 to 3 qals; hook 1 to 3 bris. Seidom—Traps 1 to 3 bris. King's Cove—Nothing doing for hook; traps doing little. Traps are being taken up at Bonavista and Catalina. "Cathomet"—Traps 1 to 3 qals. Bay Roberts—Good sign fish with hook; boats 2 to 3 qals. Burin—Squid fairly plentiful. Alameda arrived, 1,000 qals.; Greenwood, 600 qals.; Linus A., 400 qals. Conchman's Cove—Traps 2 to 7 bris.; boats 1/2 to 2 1/2 qals.

HERE ON VACATION.—Mr. M. F. Glascoe, of this city, who has been in the States the past five years, is now in town on a vacation. He has a good position with an electrical company in Lynn, Mass., and is doing well.

CHINAMEN ARRIVE.—Four Chinamen in charge of John Lee, their countrymen, arrived here by the express to-day. A Customs Officer was at the station and held them in bond. They will engage in laundry work.

TOOK PHOTOGRAPHS.—Mr. Jas. Vey took photos of His Excellency the Papal Delegate and His Grace the Archbishop standing in front of the Palace Saturday afternoon; they were also photographed there in an automobile.

DIED SUDDENLY.—William J. Targett, tinsmith, of Heart's Content, died suddenly July 17th. He was subject to fits and it is thought he died in one of them. He retired at night and was found dead in the morning. As we understand of the property will go to his brother, A. Targett, of Hart's Harbor, he will go there as tenant in his place.

The handsome new banker Gordon Hollett, owned by Hollett Bros., of Turin, arrived here at noon to-day off the Banks with a good trip of fish.
