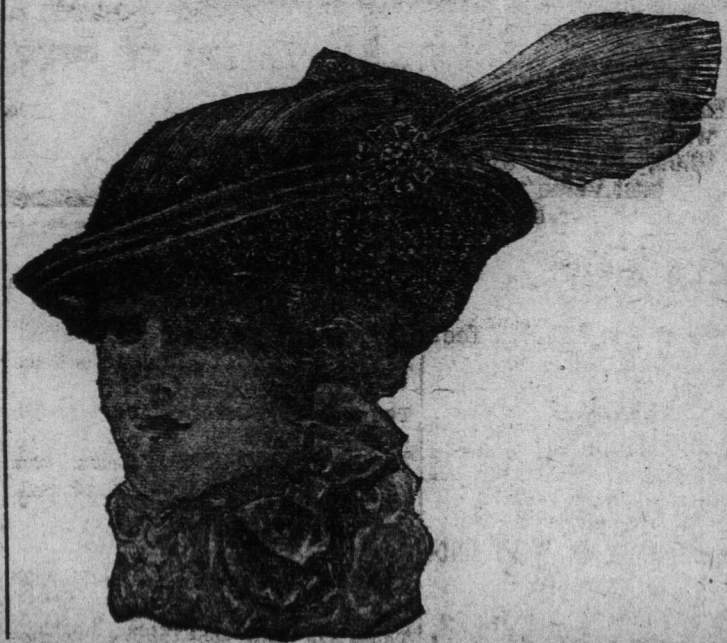

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 a.m.

#### ENCOURAGING NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The Governor, Newfoundland: Following from Press Bureau.—The French Government reports the capture of points d'appui north and south of Ypres, and the failure of the enemy's attacks in the Yosses. The Russian General Staff issued a report on Saturday stating that the Austrians had been routed with a loss of 7,000 prisoners, 30 guns and 20 machine guns.

Progress was made in the fighting at Lodz yesterday. The report states that the Germans continue to hold entrenched positions from Strykow to the west of Lodz. The German positions along the Mroza, 15 miles west of Lodz were stormed. Prisoners state that the German losses on the left bank of the Vistula are enormous. Austrian armies have locked themselves up in Cracow.

The Russians have re-occupied Czernowitz.

#### NOTHING TO REPORT.

PARIS, Nov. 30.—(Official.) There is nothing of importance to report beyond some attacks by the enemy to the north of Arras, which were without result.

#### KING GEORGE AT THE FRONT.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The Press Bureau announced today that King George had gone to France last night to visit the General Headquarters of the British Expeditionary Force. The King was accompanied by a private secretary and his equerry.

#### ENGAGEMENTS STILL PROGRESSING.

LONDON, Nov. 30. Another day of a crucial battle between the Russians and Germanic allies in Poland has passed without news of decisive results. A Berlin official statement to-night says there is nothing of importance to report from Poland. Facts as gleaned from correspondents appear to be that three semi-independent engagements are progressing between Thorn on

the north and Cracow on the south, in which both combatants have achieved local successes without distinct victory for either side. Some of the British military experts believe that Field Marshal Von Hindenberg's forces have been split into three units one of which certainly is almost completely enveloped, while the Russians have driven a wedge between the German army and its Austrian ally, in the region of Cracow. They declare the Germans have persistently underestimated their Muscovite opponents, and have opposed them with a body composed almost wholly of the 2nd line troops, but are now rushing heavy reinforcements from the western line to avert a Polish Sedan. They express the opinion that the issue depends on whether these arrive in time. The only development of today in the western theatre was a renewal by the British of the naval bombardment of the German base at Zebrugge. England was surprised at the announcement that King George had left last night on a visit to the Headquarters of the British forces in France, where he is certain of an enthusiastic reception from the soldiers. This was the fortieth birthday of Winston Spencer Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, and the papers, except a few of those antagonistic to him, pay tribute to his remarkable career. The seventieth birthday of Queen Mother Alexandra will be celebrated tomorrow.

#### NORWEGIAN STEAMER UNDER SUSPICION.

HALIFAX, Nov. 30.

The Norwegian steamer Sandefjord, bound from New York to Copenhagen, came into port this afternoon, having been ordered here by British warships for examination. Eleven British sailors were put on board the Norwegian, but the ship was brought in by her own officers and crew. She was brought to Halifax owing to the weather being too rough outside to inspect her cargo.

#### Recommended For the V. C.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—A Times Bologne despatch says: "Havildar Ganna Sing, of the Fifty-Seventh Rifles, is the first Indian to be recommended for the Victoria Cross. He has arrived aboard a hospital ship, a bundle of splints and bandages, but very cheerful and full of heart. He has five bullet wounds."

"Havildar, with fifteen men of his regiment, was attacked in a trench before dawn. The Germans were stopped for some seconds by barbed wire entanglements and lost heavily, before they broke through. In the hand to hand struggles that ensued Havildar shot a German officer whose bullet grazed his head. He took the German sword and killed ten more men before he was brought down by a bullet in the foot.

"Otherwise," he said, "I should have killed more."

Ganna Sing was the sole survivor of his party.

#### Funeral Service

FOR THE LATE R. C. SMITH.

In memory of the late W. Bro. Robert Campbell Smith, District Grand Master, Deputy, a Funeral Lodge service was held last night in the Masonic Temple. A large gathering of brethren, under Scottish and English jurisdiction in the city, were present.

Sixteen years ago the late Mr. Smith was initiated in Tasker Lodge and in 1907 occupied the chair. Only last year he was made Deputy D. G. M. A sad coincidence is that last evening he was to have been installed first R. W. M. of the new St. Andrew's Lodge, but "what man proposes God disposes" and a funeral service took the place of an installation ceremony. Following a hymn, prayer and the Grand Honours, in memory of the deceased brother, another hymn was sung, the Dead March in Saul was rendered with much effect. Responsive readings preceded a Tribute to the late Bro. Smith from W. Bro. Rev. F. C. Simpson, P.M., of Lodge St. Andrew, Sydney, C.B. On behalf of the English Lodges, D. G. M. W. Bro. Clift expressed deepest sympathy with D. G. M. Duder, and the brethren of the Scottish Lodges in the almost irreparable loss they had sustained and which loss would be felt by every member of the craft. The service, which lasted an hour, was a most imposing one and will long be remembered.

#### Doctors and Gas Fires

In an article which recently appeared in the London "Evening News," Mr. W. G. Faulkner stated: "In making my inquiries I discovered one significant fact. This was that one company—the Gas Light and Coke Company—had among their consumers 2,500 doctors who had gas fires installed in their houses, some as many as ten or a dozen; that 1,500 of these doctors had become users of gas during the past three years; and that not one had ever given them up."

Professor C. V. Boys, F.R.S., says, in the "Standard": "Sentiment and inertia are the only obstacles against the general adoption of gas fires and cooking appliances. Wonderful strides have been made, in spite of deep-rooted prejudices. A gas fire, burning with a blue, is an admirable agent for heating a room; and, as a scientist, I fail to understand how such a gas fire dries the air in a room more than any other fire."—nov17,t

#### Recruiting Commenced.

173 ENLISTED FOR SECOND CONTINGENT.

Recruiting for the second Newfoundland Contingent began at the C.L.B. Armoury last night, and judging from the large number present and the enthusiasm displayed, the spirit of patriotism has greatly increased during the past few months. Amongst those present were His Excellency the Governor, Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, Messrs. W. J. Higgins, P. F. Moore and others interested in the movement. His Excellency addressed the large gathering briefly, and referred to the duty we owe to the Empire, and the need of volunteers, after which the work of recruiting began. One hundred and seventy-nine applicants came forward, which is about twice the number that presented themselves for the first night of recruiting for the first contingent. Quite a struggle took place at the recruiting office as to who would have the honor of being first. This distinction fell to Eric Ayre, formerly of the Methodist Guards. Several applicants who were under the prescribed height, presented themselves and were rejected, but not without recognition of their loyalty and patriotism. Recruiting will be continued at 8 o'clock this evening when the officers in charge will be J. S. Ayre and E. V. Holloway. On Wednesday C. H. Henderson will be in charge; on Thursday J. C. Perez and Dr. Burden; and on Friday, J. W. Morris. Drilling and musketry instruction will begin as soon as possible so as to have the men ready to leave for England when required. It is expected that the Frontiersmen alone will contribute sixty men from here, and messages to the Camps at St. Anthony, Grand River, Mud Lake, Nain and Red Bay are expected to meet with a generous response. A meeting of the Equipment Committee was held last night to make arrangements for the procuring of kit for the volunteers.
