**The Civic Report.**

We observe that the Civic Commissioners state in their report that they have devoted their work of road-repairing to repairing sections of Waterford Bridge Road, George Street, Gower Street East and Prescott Street. The feature of this work has been an effort to prevent washouts, by the digging of storm-pits and improvements of drains and gullies. Another few months should test the efficacy of the work, and prove what advantage, if any, the new system possesses. The Commissioners draw attention to the opening of new streets and the improvements effected in adjoining property at the expense of the city. "The usual procedure has been for owners of land to get a street opened through their property, the City often actually paying for the land taken for the street, and constructing the same at considerable cost. The land is then leased and houses begin to go up. There being no water and sewerage pipes on the street a heavy expense is laid upon the City to keep the locality decent. After a while the occupants of the houses petition for water and sewerage pipes, which the City is finally granted, the total cost of the street to the City is about five or six dollars per foot, and the income of the owner of the land is the City's money has been spent in this manner for a little or nothing to several dollars per foot or frontage. It is probably no exaggeration to say that tons of thousands of dollars of the City's money have been spent in this manner for the aggrandizement of land owners."

We are pleased to find the Commissioners taking advantage of their powers and insisting before permission to build is given on owners paying the charges for the betterment of their property, brought about by laying of water pipes, etc.  
We are also glad to find the Commission is effecting a saving of \$5,000 to \$5,000 a year by disposing of nightsoil other than by haulage to country dumps. Outside of the saving itself, it is a distinct advantage to do away with this haulage. As to sewerage, the Commissioners say:  
"As an indication of the adventitious way in which the town has been allowed to grow, we find several streets with water but no sewer, and others again with sewer and no water."  
"Former Councils did a good deal of work in the extension of the Water and Sewerage systems, and it is necessary to complete the same for the older and built up portions of the City. This will have to be done at the City's expense, but the extension of the system through new streets, or streets sparsely built upon, should be done at the expense of the property owners."
