Save the Little Men.

The wants of children has a triple form. We prevent them from seeing when they are blind born and born. We are careless of them throughout infancy. We send them to school too early when they are grown children. Many factors have recently been published on these three points.
"What is happening under our eyes at Lums?" asks Mr. Arthur H. D. Aylard in the Times.
"We are all wailing through our own carelessness and blindness, thousands of men to die needlessly in the month. For want of the care which, with a serious national effort, we could easily provide now in war-time, we are losing large numbers of fine, strong men—babies who are born splendidly healthy and ready to do their share for their country some day."
"What are the facts? The infantile mortality, after falling, is rising again. For every 1,000 births in England and Wales in 1915, 110 children under one year died. A medical officer of health has said that we might reduce this rate by half. Then there is a death-rate of babies before birth nearly as large. If we could reduce these two rates by only a quarter we could save in three or four years over 100,000 lives, or the number we have lost by death at the front.
"How is it to be done? More health visitors, more infant welfare centres.

GRAIN LADEN Steamer Ashore in St. Mary's Bay.
The Norwegian steamer Lyngfjord, bound from Baltimore, U.S.A., to Cardiff, England, with a cargo of grain, went ashore at St. Vincent's, Holywood, in St. Mary's Bay, during a dense fog at three o'clock yesterday afternoon, according to a message received shortly after the mishap by Messrs. Bowring Bros. Ltd., agents here for Lloyds. Last night, about nine o'clock the s.s. Fogota, about board Mr. Tasker Cook and Mr. M. P. Cashin, accompanied by a posse of police, left for the scene of the wreck. The Lyngfjord is at present owned by Messrs. O. M. Miltrey & Co., of Christiana, and is 2510 tons gross and 1573 tons nett. She was formerly the Greek steamer Evangelos, built in 1890 by Short Bros., at Sunderland, England, her engines being constructed by G. Clark & Co. Ltd. The ship left Baltimore on May 21st with her grain cargo and passed Cape Henry the following day.

These two quite simple things alone will save thousands of lives. What stands in the way of this fundamentally patriotic work? In many places it is city councillors, town councillors, county councillors, or their advisers. They do not mean to be unpatriotic, but from this point of view they are. Excuses for inaction and delay, of course, abound. But these are all swept away by the best authorities, who are doing splendid life-saving work. The Government gives 50 per cent. of the cost. On an average throughout the country less than a halfpenny rate would go a long way and save thousands of lives. Is it not appalling that the tradition of saving the ratepayers' pocket, which is a kind of religion with many, or a most disastrous indifference, is bringing the nation into jeopardy? This is not economy, it is fearful waste.
"Some day we shall have centres within reach of the mothers just as we have schools within reach of the children. And some day we shall be sorry that we let these 'little men,' whom the country wants, die needlessly now under our eyes.
"Information as to the position in any locality and advice will, I am sure, be gladly given by the secretary of the National Association for the Prevention of Infant Mortality, whose chairman is Sir Thomas Barlow, 4, Tavistock Square, W. C."

"The infantile death-rate is far higher in enlightened Germany than in this country," says the Times. "To tell the truth, the Germans are in a very bad way with regard to the future of their race, in spite of all their material success, or perhaps because of it. The prospects of their national vitality are extremely dark, as thoughtful German observers very well know.
"Our birth-rate has been falling longer than Germany's, and it stands considerably lower. Though we save more infant life, we might save a great deal more than we do."

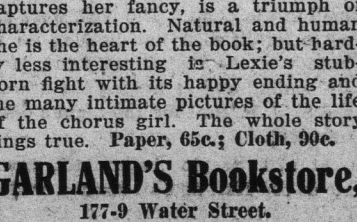
