DEBATE IN COMMONS ON RE-STRICTIONS.

LONDON, To-day. Opening the debate in the Common to-day on the statement of the Premier, David Lloyd George, Walter Runciman, after alluding to the gravity of the pronouncement, said that the last Government had adopted drastic measures of a prohibitory nature in many directions, but that the country had borne them with fortitude. Diffi-cult negotiations with the Allies had to be conducted by the Government on this subject. He commented, adding, "Our hardships here are mighty ones, as great as those of Italy, but as a matter of fact there is a difference of temperament. We in this country do not make the same fuss about restrictions as did the Italians. In this country men are ashamed to give expression to their feelings, even if the restrictions are felt to be hard." Runciman said he thought the Government should endeavour to reduce the amount of tonnage used for Government purposes, which at present was sixty-three per cent. If it could be reduced to fifty per cent. of the total tonnage, he said supplies would be permitted to enter freely to that extent. If not, the members of the House, he declared, had not heard the last of the shipping tale. Walter Hume Long in reply paid s tribute to the dominions and colonies for the manner in which they had received the restrictions upon imports which to them might be very important. The Premier, he said, desired him to say that the importation of rum was stopped altogether, there being now sufficient stock for the needs of th army, while there would be a reduc tion in the importation of wine and spirits of 75 per cent, on the basis of

LONDON, To-day. German submarines continue to sink Entente ships. The total ton-nage sunk reported on Friday was 25,456. This includes the French steamer Athos, of 12,000 tons, which was sent to the bottom in the Medi-terranean, while carrying troops to terranean, while carrying troops to France under the guard of warships. One American, Robert Allen Haden. Missionary to China, lost his life in the terpedoing of the Athos from which 1,450 persons were saved. Thirteen of the vessels reported sunk were of Entente registry, except one Norwegier, several are of unestable.
