Legislative Council.

The House met yesterday evening

at 7 o'clock to discuss the Election

Amendment Bill, but before the

House went into Committee. Hon.

Gibbs moved for an adjournment

announced the Government for

delay in furnishing reports of the

Government Engineer as previously

stated. He told the hon. leader

of the Government he intended to

keep the House open until the reports

had been received. He made many

remarks upon the present

state of the railway, and the de-

lay was such that no action

could be taken by the relatives of

the killed and injured. This, as

a member pointed out, was due

to the neglect of the Government. Mr.

Gibbs also referred to the past when

the Executive were loud in

their denunciation of Reid but now

were silent on railway conditions.

He reiterated once again his demand

for the reports wanted.

Mr. Squires followed and

stated that the condition of the road

was a disgrace to the present party.

He wished how only a short time

ago the lighted lamp had been ex-

tended in the car for fear of top-

pling. A couple of years ago

the Glenwood accident, when

passengers were burnt to death,

he promised to light all cars with

electricity but such had not been done

there had been no one to force

him to live up to his obligations.

He declared that the time was come

when further delay might cause a

tragedy rather than his "hate to hap-

pen."

Mr. Gibbs rose to speak the

next time, but perhaps the de-

bate had touched the President

of the House for he ruled the Speak-

ing order. Mr. Gibbs persisted

in speaking and although the Pres-

ident mentioned the Usher of the Black

Rod to put the member out, the Usher

did not understand, and

remained in the House.

The House then went into Commit-

tee on the Election Amendment Bill.

Mr. Gibbs continued his address,
while the President made the most of
a bad case.Hon. John Anderson succeeded Mr.
Gibbs, and added his voice in de-
claring against the present condi-tion of the railroad, as run by Reid,
and abetted by the Government.Hon. Mr. Ellis promised to table
the information as soon as he was
able to do so, and so Mr. Gibbs did

not press his motion to adjourn.

The House then went into Commit-

tee on the Election Amendment Bill.

Hon. Mr. Anderson in a lengthy
speech dealt with some of the indus-trial problems of the country, es-
pecially the housing one. He stated

that it was no good for the Govern-

ment to make promises but that ac-

tion should be immediately taken as
in other countries to grapple with ex-

isting conditions and give to the la-

bourers decent homes to live in.

Hon. Mr. Gibbs moved as an amen-

dity to the Bill, for this election on-
ly, that the interval between the re-

turns of elections to the Col. Secre-

tary and the gassing of those elect-
ed be 11 days instead of 25 days. Itwas argued by hon. members, because
of the 25 days intervening betweenthe returns of the election and the
gassing of members, it was expedi-ent that the election be held early in
May in order that the House could

meet early in June. If the Govern-

ment were sincere they would accept
his amendment, as it would expeditematters, and in no way interfere with
the date of the election.

Hon. Mr. Squires seconded the mo-

tion.

Of course objection were offered by
Hons. Mews and Ellis, but without
any apparent logical reasoning.Hons. J. D. Ryan, Anderson and
Goodridge supported the amendment,
which was unanimously carried.Hon. Mr. Squires then moved an-
other amendment that Nomination
Day be not earlier than May 14th.

Hon. Mr. Harvey objected by rea-

sufficient time for the enactment of
the necessary legislation.Hon. Mr. Squires answered the
objection by saying the same timewould be allowed as would be the
case were the original 25 days allow-

ed between Polling Day and the con-

vening of the House if nomination
day were the 8th and not the 16th as

fixed by the amendment just carried.

Hon. J. D. Ryan supported Mr.
Squires and thought opportunity

should be given to the people to sub-

scribe to another local loan instead
of going abroad.Hon. Mr. Mews, of course, could
not support the amendment.Hon. Mr. Anderson thought the
amendment a reasonable one, follow-ing that of Mr. Gibbs, which cut off
14 days of time. He also believedthat a full statement of the last loan,
with debit and credit sheets, shouldbe submitted to the House, so that the
people could see what they had or

lost by the loan.

Hon. Mr. Gibbs supported the re-

solution, and figured that if the date
of the election was May 16th, theHouse could meet for business June
3rd.Hon. Mr. Ellis could not accept the
amendment, and considered it a piece

of trickery on the part of Mr. Squires.

Hon. Mr. Squires interrupted at this
point, and made the leader of the Gov-

ernment retract his words.

At 6.35 the debate was still on,
when adjournment was taken until 3

o'clock this afternoon.

Mt. Cashel Extension.

A meeting of the representatives of
the different Catholic Societies, con-vened by Hon. J. D. Ryan, was held in
the B. I. S. Music Room last night toconsider matters in connection with
the extension of Mount Cashel Or-phanage. As originally intended the
main building was to consist of theSlattery wing, already erected, the
central portion and a second wing, but

for various reasons the work was de-

layed. It has now been decided to
proceed with the erection of the cen-tral portion, in which the Brothers
will take up residence, the old HowlerCottage being altogether unsuitable
and practically uninhabitable. To thisend it has been decided to take up a
collection, and no doubt the responsefrom the admirers of the good work
of the Brothers will be as generous asit has been in the past to all appeals
in behalf of the institution. At present

130 boys are being trained and edu-

cated there, and as the number is
steadily increasing, the demand for
extension and greater facilities is im-perative. The following officers of the
Committee were appointed lastnight:—
Chairman—Hon. J. D. Ryan.
Vice-Chairman—Hon. W. J. Ellis.Secretary—Mr. J. C. Pippy.
Treasurers—Messrs. C. J. Myler andC. Ellis.
These with the other representatives
of societies will meet on Sundaymorning when details of the project
will be arranged.

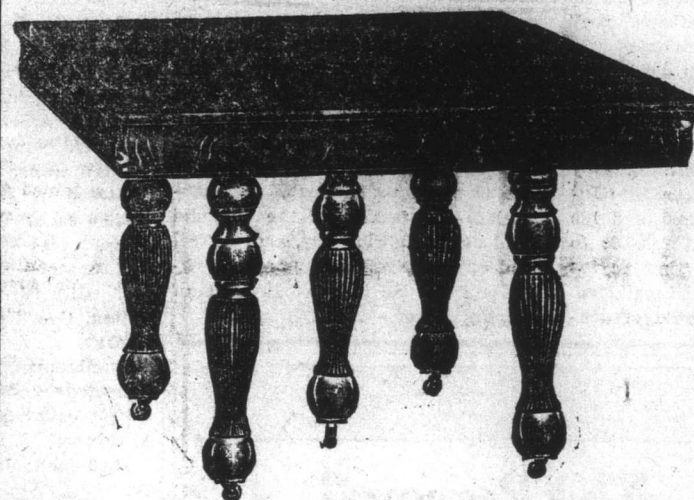
WELLINGTON'S REPAIRS.
