Japs Indignant.

NEVER HAD ANY IDEA OF JOINING HUNS.

Tokio, July.—(By the Associated Press.)—"I declare once more with a clean conscience that Japan never agreed to breach her plighted faith in her allies and associates in the war." This statement was made to-day by Viscount Yasuya Uchida, the foreign minister, to the Kokusai news agency, regarding the reports that Germany had entered into secret negotiations for an alliance during the war.

"The first story that secret negotiations were being conducted during the course of the war between Japan and Germany," said Viscount Uchida, "seems to be again attracting public attention in the United States. That such a report is persistently circulated despite the categorical denial repeatedly made by the ministry at Tokio and by the Japanese representatives at Pekin, Washington, Paris and elsewhere, apparently indicates that certain quarters interested at the present moment in the estrangement of Japan from her friends have been desperately at work with this ill-advised object in view."

About Houses.

"Boudoir" really means a "sulky," for it is derived from a French word meaning "to sulk." Thackeray had a room in his house upon the door of which was a sign: "My sulky," and whenever that door was locked he was never disturbed.

Old Railway Carriages, hulks, and even wrecks, have been used as habitations in years gone by. Some time ago, the G.E.R. would deliver a carriage body free at any of their stations for £5. If they would only do it now, what a blessing it would be in these days of housing anxieties!

Just over twenty years ago the estimates for building were as follows:—"Cost of a workman's plain country cottage, 3d. per cubic foot. Ordinary semi-detached 8 or 10-roomed house, 8d. or 9d. per cubic foot. Mansions, 2s. a cubic foot and sometimes more. These sums did not include cost of land or fencing."

A Paper House was once erected in Hamburg. It was used as a restaurant. Its walls were made of double layers of paper stretched on frames and impregnated with a fire and water proof solution. The roof and walls were fastened together by means of bolts and hinges, so that it was collapsible! The dining-room was capable of holding 150 people. There were 22 windows, 4 skylights, and the heating was effected by a couple of isolated stoves. It cost £75 to build, and was a popular rendezvous in Hamburg.
