Nfld. Scotch Cured Herring.

There is little, if anything, to report
in the Newfoundland Scotch cured her-
ring market. Stocks continue to ar-
rive in slightly increasing numbers,
but only a hand-to-mouth business is
being transacted. The new goods gen-
erally conceded to be of far better
quality than the stocks received dur-
ing the early part of the season, and
will doubtless bring much better
figures. The prevailing prices on New-
foundland Scotch cured herring are
\$14 to \$18 per barrel for large, and
matfals are selling around \$12.—N. Y.

Opposition Candidates' Meeting.

The Opposition candidates for the
West End, Hon. R. A. Squires, Dr.
Campbell and Mr. Brownrigg, met a
number of citizens in Botwood Hall
