To Develop Power in Newfoundland.

GREAT POSSIBILITIES IN OLDEST OF BRITAIN'S COLONIES.

The possibility of power development in Newfoundland were dealt with by Arthur J. Mudge, electrical engineer, in an address before the Electric Club of Toronto at the Mosspost Hotel recently.

Mr. Mudge was sent a year ago by a Toronto concern which held options on power and pulp concessions on the south coast of Newfoundland, to study the country and report on the cost of power development. The survey was made of the Bay D'Est River and the lakes feeding it. The lakes, he found, offered splendid facilities for water storage, in fact, by means of inexpensive dams the level of some of them could be raised twenty-five feet. From the lowest of the storage lakes to the river, a distance of 9 miles, a drop of 500 feet was found, making possible the development of 75,000 horse-power. The river empties into Bay D'Espoir. An industry capitalized at \$10,000,000 will be established on the river if the Toronto people carried out their plans.

Mr. Mudge's address was replete with interesting sidelights on life on the island and the habits of the people. That the island is still in a backward state, altho the oldest of British colonies, it was revealed by the statement that there are no country roads to speak of, and most of the settlers live along the coasts. St. John's, the largest city, has 40,000 inhabitants, four miles of car lines and six cars. The operations of Lord Northcliffe in establishing paper mills to supply his papers in England, was causing development in the north-eastern interior.—Toronto World.

Bell Island Elks Elect Delegates.

The regular meeting of Branch No. 3 of the B.P.O.E. was held at the L.O.A. Hall, Bell Island, last week. The Exalted Ruler, Bro. C. B. Archibald, was in the chair, and considerable business was disposed of. A deputation, consisting of the Exalted Ruler, Bro. C. B. Archibald, Esteemed Lecturing Knight, Bro. J. M. Greene and the Chaplain, Bro. C. Main, were appointed to confer with the representatives of the St. John's Branch and discuss the formation of the Grand Lodge of Newfoundland. The Amusement Committee has been re-organized, and Bro. Capt. Leo Murphy and Bro. F. F. Jardine have been added. The winter program of entertainments is already under consideration. Reports of other committees were received and accepted, while several applications for admission to membership were also tabled. Considerable work has been accomplished, and at the next meeting a lot of business will be discussed, and degrees will be conferred.

Labor Seekers May Be Disappointed.

S.S. Kyle docked at North Sydney about one o'clock on Thursday afternoon, says the Sydney Record of Nov. 12th, being about six hours behind schedule owing to the train on the Reid system arriving late at Port aux Basques. The Kyle brought one hundred and forty passengers, a large proportion of whom were seeking employment. Some eighteen were already provided for in this respect and entered the employment of the Dominion Coal Company. Passengers report conditions very serious in different parts of Newfoundland on account of the inability to dispose of fish at a reasonable price. Though conditions are undoubtedly bad in the Ancient Colony, trips abroad in search of employment merely on speculation, are apt to result in many cases in disappointment, as conditions generally point to the labor market being pretty well supplied.

N. I. W. A. Condemn Sugar Regulations.

At a meeting of the N.I.W.A. held on Friday evening last, 12th inst., an animated discussion on the sugar situation took place, in which the Food Control Board's bungling and muddling was not spared by the speakers. After lengthy debate, it was decided that the consensus of opinion be expressed in the following resolution:

- (1) That the usefulness of the Sugar Board has ceased.
- (2) That the present excessive prices being paid for sugar are beyond strictly fair play, and that the public are being saddled with the high cost of blundering officials incapacity.
- (3) That it is high time the members of the Food Control Board handed in their resignations.

Among some of the questions which the N.I.W.A. would like answered officially are these:

- (a) How much more of the high priced sugar is on hand?
- (b) What time—if ever—will it be disposed of?

Strange Discovery of a Murderer.

The punishment of a murderer named Worrell, in New South Wales, was brought about in the middle of November, 1926, by a curious sequence of events. Frederick Fisher, a freed convict, who lived in Campbell Town, and was reported to be possessed of considerable property, suddenly disappeared, and Worrell caused it to be supposed that he had gone to England. He sold off Fisher's property, and no one seems to have suspected foul play, till a man named Farley declared that he had seen Fisher's ghost, sitting on a rail not far from his old home. Oddly enough this story obtained credence, and a police constable and two natives, were set searching in the neighbourhood of the spot at which the vision was said to have appeared. Blood was found on the rail, picked out by Farley as the ghost's seat, and one of the native scouts following the direction in which the ghost was said to have pointed, went into a pool, and, to quote the words of the constable's evidence, "he took a cornstalk which he passed over the surface of the water, and put it to his nose," and said "he smelt the fat of a white man." The blacks then followed the creek leading from the pool till they came to a branch creek up which they went some little way, when one of them put a rod into the




