THE SITUATION.

(Halifax Chronicle, Sept. 2nd.)
The Boston News Bureau says:
One of the weak spots in the textile situation is exposed to public view by the announcement that the B. B. & R. Knit Co. will not pay the interest due September 2 on its first mortgage bond issue. The Consolidated Textile Corporation, which controls the Knit concern through stock ownership, figured in the news on Thursday when terms of the proposed plan of reorganization were published. The cotton mills have had pretty hard sledding for some time and those organizations which are handicapped in the matter of working capital are beginning to reveal their embarrassment.
Berlin cables were of a more constructive character yesterday, telling as they did of acceptance by the Reichstag of the Dawes agreement. The stock market response was not long in forthcoming, and while the turnover was less than the average of recent sessions most representative issues scored a substantial gain for the day.

Although the President carried with him to Plymouth, Vt., the Tariff Commission report on sugar, he has not yet announced whether he will accept the recommendation of the majority of the Commission for a 25 per cent. cut in the existing duty. As our per capita consumption of sugar is 95.6 pounds per annum, it will be seen that the pending decision of the Chief Executive is of universal interest.
Present rate of duty on Cuban sugars, which constitute the bulk of our consumption, is 1.7648 cents per pound. The Tariff Commission majority report recommended a duty of 1.35 cents per pound. Of course the opposition to the proposed tariff cut comes from the best sugar interests, who are the direct beneficiaries of the tariff. However, in order for the Government to collect \$127,500,000 on imported duty-paying sugars, chiefly Cuban, the people of the United States are being compelled to pay an increased price for every pound of sugar consumed, whether the Government has collected duty on it or not.

Popular Prisons

A new system of prison discipline is being tried out at Peterhead, the Scottish convict prison.

"Non-commissioned officers," graded as in the Army, and wearing the stripes of their rank, have been appointed from among the convicts themselves. They move freely about the prison buildings, are put in charge of other convicts, and report breaches of discipline to the warders.

Evening classes, at which all the teachers are convicts, and concerts, also run by the prisoners, are other features of the new regime. Games are played in the prison yard, with convict "N.C.O.s" as referees or umpires.

Serbia, however, has probably the most popular prisons in the world. The convicts are allowed to go out for the day. There is no fear of their escaping, as they are better fed and housed in prison than at home.
