Mr. Percy W. Browne, Chief Officer of Customs, produced certain Customs Warehouse books in connection with the case. He said that in each book there was a separate head for each licensed warehouse. Mr. C. H. Kinch had had more than one licensed warehouse. As soon as cargo was bonded, it was entered into the books under its proper head, showing the name of the vessel, the quality and description of the cargo. As soon as the entry warrant was passed, it was entered into the Entry Warehouse Book; so that it was quite easy for him to trace any consignments from the books, if the particulars as to the date and number of bond were given. There was a regular rate of duty for Canadian fish. It was 1-6 per quintal of 112 lbs. On

he 16th October, 1920, 360 casks, 51 rums and 50 half drums of fish were bonded by C. H. Kinch. Of this quantity 50 casks were duty paid. The remainder of the cargo was exported to the neighbouring islands and British Guiana. The entries in the book showed that the fish was exported by Mr. Kinch; there was no transfer. A cask was equivalent to four quintals and the duty on a cask would be \$1.44; therefore the duty paid on 50 casks

was £15. On the 31st July 1918 a shipment was landed for C. H. Kinch from the schooner "Frances Louise" Certificates were produced for 100 casks of this shipment. The whole cargo was 361 casks but of that certificates of origin were at first produced for only 100 casks. Later on certificates were produced for the balance as well as for 94 drums, and 120 half drums. Of the casks 202 casks were exported without any duty being paid and 56 were transferred, to W. H. Bryan & Co., and 56 to Mr. Kinch himself. These 56 were bonded in Mr. Finch's provisional bond. The duty on those casks transferred were paid by the

On the 10th February, the books showed that a shipiment was received by Mr. Kinch from the schooner tained 81 casks, 60 drums and 80 half drums. There were 163 casks more on the account sales corresp ith this date than the books showed. Only 50 half-drums of this was
