We were glad to welcome at the office of the "Weekly" during the past week.

Chas. H. Hutchings, K.C., Inspector General of Police of Newfoundland, who arrived in St. John's on Friday last on a short visit.

He has been in Montreal visiting his daughters, Maudie and Mrs. Copp, and in Toronto, where another daughter, Marjorie, holds an appointment on the teaching staff of the Conservatory of Music as well as being assistant vocal instructor at Bishop Strachan College. She is also Contralto Soloist of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church and was recently made a member of the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir choir into which out of some 250 applicants only 25 were admitted.

Mr. Hutchings returned to Montreal the same evening and proceeds

to Newfoundland about the end of the month.

One of my most delightful Letter Friends, who often gives me cross sections of her very normal home life, in answer to something I had written about the child who fights against helping, wrote me as follows:

"Where the dishes are very greasy or the bundles to be carried are numerous, I go along to the kitchen or the store to give my aid. I never yet heard any one say that they enjoyed doing dishes, and I think a little help makes a child more contented.

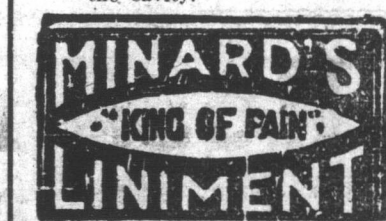

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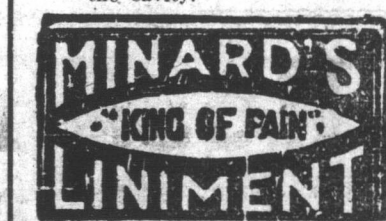
