After usual routine proceedings, Mr. Merrick moved an address for a copy of all correspondence with the Dominion Government with reference to the Acts of Incorporation of the Orange Associations of Eastern and Western Ontario, and all Orders in Council and papers in connection therewith.

In speaking to the motion, Mr. Merrick said that when the Orange Bills were before the House the Attorney-General stated that it was within the competency of this Mouse to pass such measures, and in a few days thereafter he took the unwarrantable course of reserving the Bills. He would not enter fully into the subject till the papers were produced.

Hon, Mr. Mowat in reply said that the Government offered no excuse or apology for the course they pursued. They pursued a course requiring no apology but entirely in accordance with constitutional usage. He considered it was the duty of the Dominion Minister of Justice to have settled the question, and advised the Governor-General teallow or disable control course control and vised.
