A NORTHWEST LETTER.

The following letter has been received from Lorne Murray, Francis, Assiniboia.

I had intended writing you before, but I have been busy and thought I had better wait anyway until I became better acquainted. I have now been in this country nearly three months and can therefore speak of myself as an old resident.

On coming into this country, one finds it very different from the East. The country here in general is level or slightly rolling. Some districts are dotted with little patches of bush about 12 to 20 feet in height, and this is referred to in the descriptive literature as the park-like country. Other districts, again, are entirely devoid of anything that will break the view. Our district belongs to the latter class. From where I sit I can look out of the window for miles, and the only thing that interferes with my view is an occasional building. I was going to add "or straw-stack" to the last sentence, but there is only one to be seen, the country is too new for them yet. Between here and the extreme point of vision, which is about six miles away, the ground is either green with the growing wheat, or dark brown with the new plowing. It is a fine sight, and I never tire of looking at it, for there is not only the beauty of the scene but a sense of what it holds for the future to appeal to one.

If you were to drive across the country (for no one walks), you would find that it is not as monotonous as it appears. The ground is covered with a carpet of flowers, which, as one variety follows another, continues during the entire summer until the autumn frosts. The prevailing colors now are yellow, white and blue. Soon the roses, with their pink will put the plain to blush. Frequently you will come to a slough or swamp. This is simply a depression in the ground which holds water, and can now be distinguished only by the long grass growing there. That long sinuous path, now hardly distinguishable, is an old buffalo trail, and often beside it can be seen the bleaching bones of that animal, now almost extinct, that once roamed the plains in countless numbers. The Indians, who but a few years ago hunted him, now are only to be seen on some reservation. Since coming here I have not seen an Indian nearer than Regina.

What a change has taken place in a few years. Now the settler is coming in on every train, or else he is trekking from the United States to this land of plenty and promise. Five years ago there was one man in here; now there are hundreds and soon there will be thousands. At that time a band of people trekked over from Indian head and settled in this district, 40 miles from the Railway. Then others came in, and the Railroad followed them and now we have a good settlement. The first owners bought their land for \$2.00, or \$3.00 an acre and as others came in and it was seen that the land was good the prices rose until now some of the land is selling for \$15.00 an acre, and finds buyers at that. There is no doubt that in a few years that same land will be worth from \$25.00 to \$30.00 an acre. Settlers are continually coming from everywhere to this specially favored place, and of course that makes the land go up in price. To show what we can do I shall tell you of a man just over the track from here. He came here in 1900, and since then he has never had less than 20 bushels of wheat to the acre, and has had as high as 42.

The Town of Francis is the centre of this district, both geographically, and commercially, and is a good growing town. Although we have not had the railroad nearly a year yet, still we have a population of about 300, and we have only started to grow.
