#### SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson IV .- Third Quarter, For July 23, 1916\_

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Acts xviii, 1-22.
Memory Verses, 9, 10-Golden Text, Acts xviii, 9 Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Steams.

I do not know that we can tell how long Paul remained at Athens, but he gave a faithful testimony, and some believed (chapter xvii. 34). The messenger of the Lord is apt to be discouraged if he finds opposition to his message and seemingly few if any, believing, or if after a faithful testimony there is neither a "thank you" nor a word of appreciation. It is true that we must never speak to please people nor covet their approval, but most of us are so awfully human that a word of gratitude from one who has been helped by the message is very the helped by the message is very cheering (I Thes. ii, 4; II Tim. ii, 15). The devil will be sure to tell you that you have accomplished nothing and had better seek some other occupation, and messengers have been known to heed his suggestion. I am thankful that some one said to me many years ago, as I wondered if any good was being done: "Do you recollect that when the devil sowed his tare he went his way, for he was sure mat went his way, for he was sure that they would grow? And you do not seem to think that the Word of God seem to think that the Word of God is as good seed as the deviis tares."
That helped me greatly, and since then I have gone my way after a service, saying: "Thank God; that will work; it will surely accomplish His pleasure" (last, iv, 1); Jer i. 12, R. V.), Leaving Athens, Paul went to Corinth a wicked, worldly, commercial center, notorious for its immorality, and the first thing we read of him is, not that he preached, but that he found employment with some who were of the same craft with himselfthat of tent making—and he abode with them (verses 13). He would rather work at his trade and thus care his living than be a burden to any one. He afterward wrote to this people ask-ing them to forgive bim if he had wronged them by not being a burden to them (II Cor. xii, 13-16). It does sound a little like sarcasm. The Lord Jesus Himself was known as the carpenter (Mark vi, 3) and no doubt help ed to make a living for the family till

When the Sabbath days came round Paul was ready to testify to the Jews in the synagogue that Jesus was the Christ, their Messiah (verses 4, 5 and margin). Silas and Timothy, whom he had left at Berea and for whom he had sent from Athens that they night come to him, reached him here at Corinth (xvii, 14, 15). The phrase "pressed in spirit" (rerse 5) is translated in the R. V. "constrained by the Word." Weymouth asys Paul was preceding forwards. We think of preaching tervently. We think of Jeremiah, who, when he was derided and reproached, was tempted to stop was such a burning fire within him that be had to speak (Jer. xx, 7-9). We think also of Elibu, who said that he was so constrained by the spirit within him that he was like a bottle of wine ready to burst and be had to speak that he might be refreshed (Job. 11xil

When the Jews opposed Paul and blas phemed be turned from them to gentiles and found an open door in a house close by the synagogue, ownand house of the state of the s a hotel proprietor invited us to meet in his parlors, and so we continued Paul said concerning one place, "A great door and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries" (I Cor. xvi, 9). Not with standing the opposition at Corinth there was much encouragement, for the chief ruler of the synagogue and all his house believ. ed and also many of the Corinthians (verse 8). No doubt it was, as always, because of the manifest work of the Holy Spirit that the devil stirred up such opposition. How Paul must have been strengthened to continue by that most gracious visit of the Lord Jesus Himself, who carrie to him in the night and said, "Be not a fraid, but speak, and hold not the Peace, for i am with thee, and no man shall set on thee to hurt thee for I have much people in this city" (verses 9, 10). The day that the Lord appeared to him on the way to Damascus he said. "I have appear ed unto thee, and | will appear unto thee" (chapter xxvi, 16), and this was one of those other appearings to him. We have His completed word and can hear Him speak to us at any time if only we have ears to hear, for He is the same ford who revealed Him. self to Samuel by His word (1 Sam. ill, 21), and He loves to do itstill. Being thus strengthened, he continued at Corinth a year and six months, teach ing the word of God a mong them (verse ing the word of God along deriverse 11). In due time he sailed thence, tak-ing Priscilla and Aquila, and, leaving them at Ephesus, he went on to Cae-sarea and Jerusalem and Antioch and thus completed his second missionary journey (verses 18-22). We would like to know where he left Timothy and what became of Silas, but we shall meet Timothy again, and we can wait to know a lot of things. It seemed to Paul that he must be in Jerusalem in the near future, but note his "it God vill" and he las. iv, 15.

ELGIN HAS SUPPLIED 1,741 RECRUITS IN ONE YEAR. Over 2,200 Men Offered Services

62 Aylmer Men Join the Colors

Saturday, 16th July, 1916, closed the first year of the central recruiting office for the city of St. Thomas and the County of Elgin.

During the 313 working days of the year the average daily enlistment has been over 4.55, or a total for the year of 1,426 men enlisted. These figures include 262 men enlisted at central office by Major Stacey for D Company of the 70th Battalion, but later A Company, and the nucleus of the 91st Battalion.

Of the 1,426 men, 418 were married and 1,008 single at the time of enlistment. By nationalities they were as follow: Canadians, 675; English, 562 : Scottish, 76 ; Irish, 30; other nationalities, 83,

The principal churches were represented as follows: Church of England, 549; Methodist, 342; Presbyterian. 214; Baptists and Congregationalists, 134; Roman Catholics, 121; other churches, including the S.A., Disciples, etc., 66.

Prior to the opening of the central office 315 men were enlisted in St Thomas for the First and Second Canadian Contingents, making a total enlistment in the city of 1,741 men. Of this number 1.134 were residents in the city at the time of their enlistment. Of the remaining 607, 334 were resident in the County Elgin and the balance of Americans and 33 residents of London, Ontario.

The various units in which St. Thomas and Elgin men have enlisted includes practically every arm of the service. first and foremost, of course, being, in point of size, "Elgin's Pride," the 91st Battalion, C.E.F. Other units which have received ex-

been the 1st Battalion, the 18th Battalion, the 33rd, 34th, 70th and 71st Battalions, the P.P.L.I., the various Universities Companies, formed to reinforce the P.P.L.I., the Mechanical Transport, the Canadian Dental Corps, the C.A.M.C., the Canadian Engineers, the C.M.R., the 1st Construction Battalion, the Canadian Signalling Corps, etc.

Over 2,200 men have been medically examined for active service by the medical officers: Major F. Guest, Capain J. D. Curtis, and since these offiers went overseas by Captain W. F. Cornett. 15th Field Ambulance, Lonlon. The rejects as medically unfit

active service have numbered 470. 


