THE APPLE CROP FAILURE.

Probable Cause and the Reme-

Cornell University Experiment Station has issued a bulletin prepared by Prof. L. H. Bailey on the condition of fruit growing in Western New York, one portion of which will be of special interest to readers of the ADVERTISER, as in many sections of Ontario so in Western New York the apple crop is almost a total failure; in fact, the only satisfactory fruit crops there this season are strawberries and grapes. In regard to the cause of failure in case of the larger fruits, Prof. Bailey writes:

It is an almost universal opinion among growers that the weather is responsible for the general failure, particularly in the case of apples, where failure is the most comple and disastrous, and which were just passing out of bloom when a prolonged atorm of unusual severity and accompanied by lightning passed over the country. It has long been supposed that cold and heavy rain at blooming time will prevent fertilization of the flowers, and the idea appears to be universally accepted. Yet I know of no reason for thinking it generally true, or at least of sufficient moment to account for the failure of a crop. There are not only strong general reasons for doubting the notion, but several minor observations are also against it. For instance, two Seckel pear trees, equally exposed and of the same age, both of which bore a heavy crop last year, stand but a rod apart and were in bloom at the same time; one has no fruit and the other is loaded. We have all observed good crops of fruit when the proper in mind that fully four-fifths of the flowers of apples and pears fall naturally. The flowers are borne in clusters, yet the fruits are usually borne singly. The rodundancy of flowers appears to be nature's wholly aside from its position in the cluster, appropriates energy to itself, while its neighbors fail.
