JOHN DEATH STATES AND STATES AND

Joseph Faulder Confesses That He Tried to Influence a Juror

To Stand Out for his Brother-in-Law ou Trial.

Verdict for the Plaintiffs in Noyes vs. Young-Proceedings of the Winter Assizes Before Judge

Meredith.

Wednesday Aiternoen. The seventh suit for damages engaged the court's attention this afternoon and evening. James and Jane Noyes were the plaintitis, and Seth Young was the de-fendant. Mr. and Mrs. Noyes live on a farm near Byron, and Young is a West Nissouri blacksmith. The parties were in the city on June 23 last, and about 4 o'clock in the afternoon Noyes and his wife prepared to go home. They got into their rig on King street, west of Richmond, and were just going to drive off when a runaway team of horses, attached to a heavy rig, ran into their wagon. The tongue of the air. They landed on the block pavement and the runaways trampled on both plaintiffs. Noyes and his wife were picked up for dead and carried into an adjoining hotel. It was found that Noves had three ribs broken, severe internal injuries, and was bruised and cut about the back and shoulders. His nervous system was also shocked, and he has not yet fully recovered from the effects. Mrs. Noyes received severe bruises on her arms and shoulders and her left foot and leg. Noyes claims that the accident was caused by recklessness on the part of Young, and wants \$3,000 damages. His w fe asks \$2,000. Young denies the charge of carelessness. He was returning from his son's house on Clarence street. and when near Richmond one of the horses took fright at a street car. A break in the rig caused the other horse to join, and then they went at a lively gait. In trying to stop his horses the lines broke, causing him to fall out of the wagon and onto the road, The collision with Noyes' rig soon followed.

PLENTY OF EVIDENCE. A number of witnesses were examined. The court sat till 7 o'clock and then adjourned for an hour. The evidence for Noyes and his wife went principally to prove that Young had gone into Walsh's hotel on King street and left the team out-

side and untied. Young stuck to his story as given above until cross-examined by counsel for Noyes, when he got tangled up. His statements at a previous examination were compared with his present evidence, and were found to differ materially. Young, however, abandoned the old evidence and stuck to

George and Miss Young were also ex-amined, and a host of doctors gave technical descriptions of the injuries received by the plaintiff.

Mr. George Powell, the King street marble dealer, saw the accident, but denied that Young's team had passed his shop. He had been standing in front of his shop and would have noticed the runaway if it had occurred.

Counsel then addressed the jury, and the court adjourned at 9:30 p.m. Thursday Morning. Justice Meredith began his address the jury in the Noyes-Young case at 10 o'clook. He gave a clear review of the evidence given by both sides, and stated that if the story given by the plaintiffs was to be believed negligence on the part of Young had been clearly proven. He clearly allowed the inference to be drawn that he did not place much reliance on the evidence given by Young and other witnesses for the defense. He criticised it very severely in many respects and left the

case in the hands of the jury.

The jury returned a verdict for \$250—\$150 for Mr. Noyes and \$100 for his wife with full costs.

FAULDER ON TRIAL. The only criminal case on the calendarthat of the Queen against Faulder—was next taken up. Joseph N. Faulder is a McGillivray township farmer, and is accused of attempting to bribe a juryman. At the December sessions John Hodgins and Wells Sholdice and Edward Sholdice, all of McGillivray, were placed on trial for the alleged theft of about \$400 worth of goods from Muir's woolen mill, in Exeter. John Mawson, of McGillivray, was a jury-

stand out for Hodgins' acquittal. Faulder was arraigned and pleaded not guilty. Squire John B. Smyth recognized the information laid against Hodgins and the

warrant for the arrest. Sheriff Cameron was also called, merely to identify the petit jury panel chosen for the session.

MAWSON IN THE BOX. John Mawson, the juror, was next called. He was a McGillivray man, and had known both Hodgins and Faulder for about fifteen years. On the Sunday evening before the December sessions Fautder came to his house and called him out, saying that he wanted to see witness. Mawson went cutside and then Faulder asked him if, were he on the jury, he would

HOLD OUT FOR HODGINS? "I answered that I could not tell until I heard the evidence," continued Mawson, whereupon Faulder said they had not evidence the size of a man's hand against Hodgins, and that if I held out in his favor he would make it all right.' Q-How did he mean that he would make it all right? A .- He did not say.

Q.-No money mentioned? A.-No; nothing about the amount. Mr. Magee endeavored to bring to Mawson's recollection a previous statement he

had made. Judge Meredith-Did you on any previous occasion say more than that? "Well," replied Mawson, "when I was challenged at the sessions and put in the box I was all shaken to pieces, and, I believe, stated that Faulder promised to

pay me." FAULDER'S CO NEESSION. James F. McFadden, county constable, was the man who arrested Faulder. He had a long conversation with the accused when on the way to the city. Faulder said he would not deny the charge. He knew he was doing wrong and that he would be punished if found out. Faulder also stated that he wanted to screen Hodgins

FOR HIS SISTER'S SAKE. Witness' sister was Hodgins' wife. The prisoner also told McFadden that he had promised to see Mawson well paid, but not

McFadden was given a rough overhauling by Mr. Meredith. He acknowledged having been on the county constabulary for twelve years. He had been dismissed once. Q.-What for? A.-Neglect of duty.

Q .- Was it not for bringing A MAN WITHOUT LEGS to jail in an open carriage when the thermometer was away below zero? A .- That is what I did.

Q. -Because the cripple infringed the Scott Act? A .- Yes. The defense sought to prove the accused's good character. The jury in the Faulder bribery case returned a verdict of not guilty. They evidently leaned on the side of mercy.

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.

Browne presented the yearly report as follows: "It is again my privilege to read to you the report of your directors as to what has been done by them during the past year, and as the interests of this society are, we may say, wholly wrapt up in the success of the Western Fair, so our report is nessarily brief. The statement of that association will be published shortly and will show a very healthy state of affairs, notwithstanding the general falling off of receipts in other

and larger places."
"It may seem insignificant at first sight that we as an organization are merely an auxiliary to that institution, but when we consider how important a part we take in the management of these fairs, and the beneficial effect they have on the trade, commerce and manufacturing industries of this city in bringing such a large number of visitors here, and in advertising the city far and wide as the great railway center of the finest agricultural district of the Province, then we see that we are of very con-

"It has been suggested that we should again try and hold a winter show of our own, but the matter being brought forward somewhat late and for other reasons it was decided to leave it to the incoming board to deal with when they could have a full year ahead to make preparations should they decide favorably. The membership is 147, this fee and the Government grant have been handed over to the treasurer of the Western Fair Association. The financial statement showed the receipts to have been \$503 82. They consisted of membership fees, \$147; Ontario Government grant, \$350; interest, \$6 82. After paying the usual expenses the balance, \$388 57, was paid over to the Western Fair Association.
