Splendid Showing Made by the Budget.

The Past Year a Record-Breaker—Wiping Out the National Debt.

London, April 17.-Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, delivered the speech introducing the budget in the House of Commons yesterday. He began by saying that, de- Preparations for a Monster Strike for bly, was yesterday afternoon selected spite the fact that the expenditure of the last fiscal year had been greater than that of any year since the last great war, the surplus in the treasury was the largest that had ever been known, and that the credit of the country fas never so high. The yield of comols to the purchaser, he said, was just about half what it was a century ago, and a larger sum had been applied to the reduction of the national debt than had ever been applied to it within a similar period. The deposits in savings banks and permament accounts in ordinary banks had amounted to an unprecedented point, and the production of gold throughout the world had been the highest ever known. The amount of bullion n the Bank of England was £49,000,-000, and the reserve fund in the bank in proportion to its liabilities was the highest on record. Continuing, Sir Michael said that the position of the working classes had never been so satisfactory, and the issue of produce stamps supplied the best possible measure of ascertaining that business transactions had never reached so great a volume. Altogether, he aid, the past year had been a wonderful one. The great triumph of a Chancellor of the Exchequer, he said, was when the receipts and estimates were equal; but the figures of this year became remarkable in respect of the receipts exceeding the estimates. Everything, he declared, had had an upward tendency, especially during the latter half of 1895. The increase in the value of exports, imports, railway earnings and banking and clearing house returns, show a continuous expansion of trade. The revenue for the fiscal year had been £101,974,000, while for the year 150 % the revenue had been only £94,684,000, showing an increase of £7,290,000, and making an excess of £5,812,000 over the estimates. One great feature had been the increase of revenue from tobacco, wine and tea, the latter having steadily driven coffee out of the market. British and Irish spirits had also driven foreign spirits out of the mar-The import of spirits had declined 19 per cent, and the popular taste for rum was greatly lessening. Tea had yielded £120,000 over the estimates, implying an increased consumption of £10,000,000 of that commodity. In connection with this, he added, there was a large and welcome transfer of the tea trade from China to British India and Ceylon. (Cheers.) The receipts from wines, he said, had been £1,250,000. This seemed to be largely due to an increased consumption of vinous liquors by members of the Stock Exchange and speculators, who, it appeared consoled themselves in non-success and rejoiced in success in the consumption of champagne. In this way he

accounted for the dealings in 1,200,000 extra bottles of champagne. After referring to the great increase in the excise and death duties, the Chancellor turned to the expenditures of the Government, which, he said, had reached the total sum of £97,764,-000, leaving a surplus of £4,208,000, which would be applied in the the national defenses, as explained in the Naval Works Bill. During the year, he continued, the national debt had been reduced £8,134,000—the largest reduction on record, with the exception of the reduction during the year 1894-95 The unfunded debt stood at the lowest point it had reached in 21 years, and the funded debt had not materially increased since the Crimean war. WONDERS NEVER CEASE.

The Latest Triumph of the Roentgen Ray -Will Kill Diphtheria and Typhoid Germs.

Chicago, Ill., April 17.-Prof. H. P. Pratt and Prof. Hugh Wightmann announce that diphtheria and typhoid germs are absolutely killed by the without reserve. The decision was reached last night in the laboratory, when the last of the germs which had been exposed to the rays failed to show signs of life under the glass, the deadbacilli remaining idle and inactive n the midst of the best and most tempting imitation of human tissue Prof. Wightmann prepared four new colonies of epidemic breeders. They were labeled as cholera, tuberculosis, og cholera and diphtheria. They were ocated on tubes filed with nutriment. Prof. Pratt turned the current into the great cell, and the rays were thrown into the groups of bacilli. The magic agency was allowed to work 62 min utes. A critical and elaborate examin ation showed a great chemical change. It was evident that the force had acted upon the artificial tissue.
