Shall Pupils Pay?

The Collegiate Institute Fee Question Discussed.

The Matter Left Over-The Poor Man's Child Chiefly Affected.

There was a short meeting of No. 1 committee of the Board of Education last night, Trustee G. J. Griffin in the chair. The members present were: Trustees Greenless, Murphy, Logan, Dr. Campbell, Sanders and Johnston. Principal Merchant and Inspector Carson were also in attendance.

The first question for discussion was Trustee Griffin's motion to impose a fee of \$10 upon Collegiate Institute scholars. Mr. Logan moved that the matter be left as it stood, as in past years

things were very satisfactory.

Mr. Johnston moved in amendment
that the fee be charged in the upper orms only. Mr. Merchant, when asked for his opinion, stated that the upper forms were more crowded than the lower forms, and a reference to the annual report showed that nearly 600 of the scholars were children of mechanics.
Trustee Murphy—It is the poof man's child who makes his mark. Mr. Carson stated that the majority of those who matriculated were children of the poorer classes, and cited numerous instances.

Mr. Griffin-In Toronto and other places they pay \$20 per year, and my motion only called for \$10. Dr. Campbell was against any tax as those who matriculated were mostly all poor. Mr. Murphy—It is enough to tax outsiders, but as it is now, I don't believe in it.

Mr. Griffin further supported his motion, but Trustee Sanders told him the people of No. 5 ward were in favor of free schools and free education, and that he himself thought at one time a tax should be levied, but he didn't think so now. Mr. Johnston stated that he had

asked for information and had obtained it, He understood that it was rich men's children that went through the upper forms. Principal Merchant-We have a register, where all this information can obtained. Mr. Greenlees-I will vote against

any fee being charged. Mr. Sanders moved that the matter be left over and report progress to the board. Carried. On the planetarium and map questions no action was taken. The matter of increase in the inspector's salary was left in abeyance. Some discussion ensued upon a moon to change certain teachers on the
