#### The Wealthy Chinese Hurrying Away From Canton.

Jesuit Fathers and 100 Native Christians Murdered in the Southern Part of Chi Li-Admiral Seymour's Position-Large Chinese Force Proceeding to Pekin-How Tien Tsin Was Relieved.

UNREST AT CANTON. The unrest at Canton is described by a dispatch from that city to the Daily Telegraph, dated Monday, via Hong Kong, yesterday: "It is feared that we are on the eve of a scene of bloodshed and anarchy in the two Quangs only paralleled during the Tai Ping rebellion. The signs of a mur-derous uprising are so manifest that wealthy Chinese are nurry Canton and the vicinity, taking their

wives, families and valuables. LI SENT TO PEKIN. "LA Hung Chang has been again peremptorily ordered to Pekin. His ene-

mies declare that they will murder him before he can reach there. His presence alone restrains the revolutionary elements here. His departure will let loose the Black Flags and Red Girdles. Knowing this, Li's trusted officers are sending their families to Hong Kong. The viceroy himself trusts the Americans in this crisis. He says that they alone want no territory, and the places himself largely-almost unreservedly-in their hands.

"All the missionaries have been notified through the medium of runners. They are leaving Canton hurriedly, and only a few are now here.

"Commander McLean, of the United States steamship Don Juan de Austria, ed is the first here to protect foreign interests. He is capable and energetic, and is reinforced by her majesty's ship Red Pole. Two hundred foreign residents of Shameena are armed. Canton population reaches 2,000,000, in addition to 250,000 living on junks and sampans (flat-bottomed river boats). Most of these people are disaffected, and incendiary proclamations are increasing the number of the virulent."

THE RELIEF OF TIEN TSIN. A Che Foo dispatch, dated June 26. says: The Americans and British entered Tien Tsin, first silencing the guns of the arsenal and breaking through the Chinese lines. The for-eigners were close behind. The Russians lost four killed and 30 wounded. The losses of the other nationalities

were small. WHERE SEYMOUR IS. Admiral Seymour's force is about ten miles from Tien Tsin. It is surrounded by Chinese troops and Box-ers, and hampered by the presence of sick and wounded. It is reported that all foreigners were sent from Pekin with a weak Chinese guard, and it is assumed that they are with Admiral

A Washington telegram says: This is the first word of any kind that has lo-cated the party of 2,500, under Vice-Admiral Seymour, and including Capt. McCalla, with about 100 United States

marines. In Admiral Kempff's information it discloses that Admiral Seymour's force, last heard of at Lang Fang, short of supplies and water, and with a menacing army of Chinese about it, retraced a good part of the distance previously covered, and is now back within ten miles from Tien Tsin. The distance from Tien Tsin to Lang Fang is 55 miles, and to Pekin about 80 miles. It is to succor this party that the latest ex-pedition left Tien Tsin on June 24, according to the closing words of Admiral Kempff's report. The first body of foreign troops, about 450 in number, and including 56 American marines, which went to Pekin to guard the legations, is thought to have gotten through.

JAPS LANDING AT TAKU. A Che Foo dispatch says: One thousand Japanese are landing at Taku, and 2,000 more are expected tomorrow, when a battalion of French is also due. The Netherlands cruiser Holland has left Java for Che Poo.

Shanghai cables say that the French consul there has received a telegram from Shang Tung asserting that 11,000 Chinese troops are making a forced march from Shan Tung to Pekin. WANT AN ALLIED ARMY OF A

HUNDRED THOUSAND. The foreigners everywhere are urging the immediate concentration of an army of 100,000 men, or at least 50,000 men. persons familiar with the Chinese character think the foreign ministers

Merchantmen arriving here report that the Boxers are drilling in the streets of New Chwang, and that when officials inspected the soldiers, with the view of ing to a dispatch to the Daily Express, suppressing the Boxers, they found the soldiers had sold their rifles and equipments to the Boxers. CHINESE FORCE 400,000 STRONG.

It is estimated that 60,000 soldiers, ese officers boast that they have 400,000 soldiers. Seymour's force carried a week's rations, and the men had an average of 150 rounds of ammunition.

RUSSIANS ARE WILD. The Russians' conduct at Taku, according to the other officers, inflamed the natives. The Russians are report-ed to have been shooting the Chinese indiscriminately, and driving away the peaceful Chinese, who would have procured transportation and provisions, and to have looted the town.

MISSIONARIES IN DISTRESS. There are about 150 American and British missionaries at Che Foo. They are short of money and clothes. United States Consul John Fowler's ship is expected to bring 50 missionaries and French priests from the mouth of the Yellow River, whither they are flocking from the interior. The commander of the Chinese cruiser Hai Chi. at Teng Chow, offered Mr. Fowler to go to the relief of the missions at Yang Chie Kiang if assured of protection.

DISCORD AMONG ALLIES. The officers of the British first-class cruiser Terrible assert that discord exists between the Russian and Anglo-Americans, and say they believe the Russians are planning to break the concert and take possession of Pekin independently. They assert that Vice-Admiral Seymour's command lacked unison, the foreigners sulking because they were under British leadership. They bitterly denounce the general conduct of the Russians as uncivilized and barbarous, and charge that the slaughter of peaceful Chinese at Taku has aroused the otherwise passive natives against the foreigners.

#### In the Commons.

GOVERNMENT STATEMENT. London, June 26.-Replying to a question of Sir Ellis Ashmead Bartlett (Con.) in the House of Commons, the first lord of the admiralty, Mr. George J. Goschen, admitted that owing to the absence of the senior British admiral, the Russian admiral was the head of the international forces

Mr. William St. John Brodrick said: 'We have no direct information from the legations of Admiral Seymour's force, or from Tien Tsin. Our last information from the officer in charge at Wei Hai Wei is that 3,000 of the force for the relief of Tien Tsin was encamped within nine miles of Tien Tsin on the evening of June 23. From private creditable sources we are informed that the relief force subsequently entered Tien Tsin and marched north, and that the legations were not harmed up to June 20. We earnestly hope this is true.'

Connection Opened Between the Admiral and the Relief Column.

London, June 27.-A special from Shanghai, dated last evening, says that communication with Admiral Seymour was opened by the Tien Tsin relief force Sunday. Admiral Seymour was at that time said to be ten miles from Tien Tsin. Three hundred of the members of his party were reported sick, and wounded, and only a few had betn killed. They were short of provisions, and were returning without having rescued the legations.

Shanghai, June 27.-A German paper has an uncredited statement to the effect that Admiral Seymour is eight miles from Tien Tsin, with 62 killed and 200 wounded.

End of the Long Strike in Chicago Seems in Sight

The Ironworkers' Conference Will Affect 40,000 Men.

Chicago, June 27 .- At 2:15 this morning the Bricklayers' Union withdrew from the Building Trades' Council. It is said this marks the practical ending of the strike that has been in progress for months, tying up building operations in Chicago, and keeping many thousands of men idle. This afternoon the arbitration committee of the bricklayers will meet the arbitration committee of the Chicago Masons' and Builders' Association, and sign a working agreement to extend to April, 1902, and the bricklayers will immediately be given work. As the bridge and structural iron workers, gas fitters, plumbers, plasterers and hod car-riers have been on the verge of quitting the trades council for over a week, they will now in all probability follow the course of the bricklayers. The bricklayers have a membership of over 3,000. The strike has lasted from October, 1899, until June, 1900, involving a loss in wages to laborers in and within a radius of 100 miles of Chicago of over \$150,000 a day. About 50,000 men are said to have been idle most of the time. Not since the great railroad strike of 1894 has there been a strike in this country which approached the proportions of the amalgamated building trades in Chicago. It began, practically Oct. 1, 1899, but for more than a year prior buildings had been constructed under unsatisfactory conditions, and at a cost vastly higher than

was warranted. FORTY THOUSAND IRON MEN

AFFECTED. Detroit, June 27 .- An important conference between the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers and the chief officers of the two big iron and steel trusts, the Republic Iron Company and the American Steel Hoop Company, is being held in the Union Trust building, the out-come of which is eagerly watched for by nearly 40,000 men throughout the country. So far the conferees are now no nearer a decision than they were before. Yesterday was spent in discussing the "puddling and finishing" scale. It seems now more than likely that the conference will adjourn without taking any action, and it will be necessary to call another conference for some future date.
