ACCUSES HER BROTHER

Of Murdering Husband After Twenty-Five Years.

Logansport, Ind., Oct. 28.—Isaac Stover was arrested Monday on a complaint filed by his sister charging him with the murder of her husband 25 years ago. The sister declares that she was one of the eye-witnesses of the tragedy.

Harriet Ritter asserts in an affidavit that March 9, 1878, her brother, Isaac Stover, murdered her husband, Edward Ritter, near Lewisburg, this county. The crime was committed, Mrs. Ritter declares, in the presence of three witnesses, she being one. Her husband was struck down with a rock. In the few short hours that Ritter lived after the blow, she says, her brother got away, and until only a few months ago never returned to this vicinity. Then he came back, she declares, and within a week so brutally beat her father that the old man died.

Mrs. Ritter further says she caused the arrest for the protection of the life of her aged mother. The widow states that she feels justified in shielding her brother so long, simply for brotherly love, but that since the years that have elapsed have not changed his disposition, she believes he will be better off in prison.

KILLED NEAR KOMOKA

A G. T. R. Express Runs Down an Unknown Man.

Mount Brydges, Ont., Oct. 28.—An unknown man walking east on the G. T. R. track yesterday between Mount Brydges and Komoka, was killed by the express, west-bound, at 3 p.m. Nothing was known of him that would identify him. He was apparently about 60 years of age, of sandy complexion, about 5 feet 7 or 8 inches in height.

ONTARIO'S AGRICULTURE

Figures From the Census Bulletin Just Issued.

Ottawa, Oct. 28.—The census bureau issued a bulletin yesterday dealing with the agricultural resources of Ontario. The province has an area above tide level of 196,951,636 acres—141,125,330 land, 28,826,796 water. Of the land, 15.13 per cent is occupied by farms. Agricultural values have been taken for the first time in this census. They show for farms and lots in the province a total for crops and buildings of \$747,562,588; for implements and machinery, \$52,597,739; for live stock, \$131,827,632; and for the crops and animal products of the census year \$196,562,362. For farms alone the value of land and buildings is \$745,598,592; of implements and machinery, \$52,597,739; of live stock, \$123,243,901; and of crops and animal products, \$192,866,303.

LABOR LEADER BEATEN

The Fight in Chicago Has Become Murderous One.

Chicago, Oct. 28.—Wm. Russell, a member of the finance committee of the Chicago Federation of Labor and former business agent of the International Association of Machinists, is at his home suffering from an attack, made upon him by four unidentified men. Russell, after being dragged, was horribly beaten by the quartet, which then left him lying in a gutter for dead. The circumstances of the attack are similar to those of the attack a few weeks ago on Michael Donnelly, president of the Amalgamated Meat Men and Butchers' Organization. President Schardt, of the Chicago Federation of Labor, has also been receiving threatening letters recently.

New York, Oct. 28.—A young woman, who says she is Mrs. Frederick Titus, of 229 East Eighty-fourth street, Manhattan, tried to swallow a \$20 bill yesterday while on her way to police headquarters in Hoboken in charge of two detectives.

Mrs. Titus and a young man who claimed to be her husband were accused of using the \$20 bill in working the film-flam game on storekeepers. Detective Wm. O'Donohue garrotted the young woman in her attempt to swallow the bill, and she was taken to the hospital.

KENNARD ACQUITTED

A Toronto Boy Cleared of the Charge of Manslaughter.

Toronto, Oct. 28.—The jury in the criminal assizes yesterday acquitted Alf Kennard, a lad of 15, of the charge of manslaughter for the death of Wm. Glass. The two were employees of the William Glass Company, and it was charged that in an altercation in December last, Kennard threw a knife at Glass, wounding him in the back. Glass did not die, however, until June 12 last. Medical evidence went to show that the lad died from blood-poisoning following the knife-wound.
