Ottawa, Sept. 5.-A mysterious 12dnight drowning took place on Saturday night, and two men are held in connection with the case by the police.

The police had been scouring the parks for tramps, and saw two men under the influence of liquor, in company with a woman, go down to the water's edge in the Ottawa River. Two constables fol lowed them and saw them go to a boathouse. The police knocked at the door,

Their names are Archibald Balster and Pierre Brisebois. The woman was missing and the men said she had got away out of a back door. It was thought that she might not have escaped and the river was dragged.
