

The foreclosure proceedings about to be started are above the signature of the law firm of Sale & Kerby, acting for mortgagees, whose names are suppressed.

BOARD OF EDUCATION NAMES A DELEGATE

Will Ask the Ontario Government for a Grant for the Western University.

The board of education will assist the board of governors of the Western University in obtaining a grant from the Provincial Government, and will be represented on the deputation by Mr. W. W. Gammage, chairman of the board.

Plea for Assistance.

"We come before you to ask that you send a deputation with us to interview the Ontario Government, prohibiting the day next week," said Capt. Murphy, spokesman for the deputation. "We will send a large number down from the board of trade, the city council, the senate, and other city bodies, and also many from the outlying districts, and from St. Thomas, Stratford, Chatham, Windsor, Sarnia, and other points. We are going to ask for our rights. Western Ontario—contributed in 1908 the sum of \$188,235 to the succession duties, of which one-half went to the University of Toronto. In 1909 the sum reached \$252,222. Of this amount the city of Middlesex contributed \$45,337. The Western University has not received a single cent of this money, and I submit that we are entitled to some of it. We would like to have representatives from the board of education to help us."

Ex-Mayor Speaks.

Ex-Mayor Stokely spoke briefly, and declared the object to be one worthy of the best efforts of the citizens. He had found the board of education for the most in the scheme for the betterment of the city, and he was confident that they would not fall down at this time.

A Strong Deputation.

"I think the deputation should be stronger in numbers," said Trustee Hunt. "I move that the chairman of the board, and the chairman of No. 1, and No. 2 committees go to Toronto. We should make a bold front, I think."

BRAKEMAN'S DEATH PURELY ACCIDENTAL

Nobody to Blame for Death of Cook at Port Stanley.

St. Thomas, Feb. 2.—The coroner's jury on the death of Willis R. Cook, who was killed at Port Stanley by the Pere Marquette snowplow on the 22nd of January last, found tonight that he was fatally injured while attempting to board a snowplow, and no blame was attached to any of the employees of the company.

A Four-Track Road.

The M. C. R. has 22 locomotives being built to meet the expected increase of traffic that will result from the completion of the tunnel. The trackage in the yards will be increased by the removal of the round-house and the mechanical departments. The switches will be moved to the eastern limits of the company's property.

Washington, Feb. 2.—In a wood-chopper at work near home, Mrs. Albert Holly today recognized her husband, whom she had not seen since he marched away as a soldier in the civil war, 48 years ago.

London, Feb. 2.—Miss Caroline Astor Drayton, of New York, only daughter of J. Coleman Drayton, and granddaughter of the late William Astor, today became the wife of William Phillips, secretary of the United States embassy. The parish church at Rye, Sussex, one of those quaint edifices so familiar in English villages, was the scene of the wedding ceremony, which was performed at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and witnessed by a large party of relatives and other friends. Rev. Canon Edgar Sheppard, sub-dean of the Chapel Royal, officiated.

C., \$75,000, toward \$200,000.


