## RICHMOND STREET

"I doubt that the work will be finished so that the Harbor Company can put down the pavement," said Mr. Wright. "The rate of progress is most unsatisfactory."

Several of the aldermen expressed their opinions relative to the matter, but no definite action was taken.

Tenders for the construction of three bathhouses on the River Thames were opened, but the contract was not awarded, owing to the fact that the location for the houses had not been decided upon. This will be done before the next meeting of the committee.

## Cromwell Street.

The opening up of Cromwell street caused some discussion. This street is now a gravel pit owned by Mr. W. J. Anthistle. Some time ago, some of the residents of the north end, among them Ald. Donnelly, asked the council to open the street up. Many years ago it used to be a thoroughfare, but it was found to be a fine gravel bed, and it was sold to the city. City Engineer Wright reported that it would cost \$6,000 to open the street up again. It was recommended that Mr. Anthistle be asked to put the thoroughfare in good shape.

City Engineer Wright reported that the smoke nuisance complained of in the vicinity of Adelaide and Central Avenue would be abated, as the C. P. R. were installing new smoke stacks that would prevent the smoke escaping in such clouds.

A mistake had been made in the allotment of the cost of the Orchard Street sewer, and City Engineer Wright's report will be sent to the council.

**Watchman at Egerton Street.**

The reply of the Grand Trunk Railway Company to the proposition made by the board that a watchman be placed at the Egerton street crossing has not yet been received, but it is expected before the next meeting of the committee.

On the recommendation of Engineer Wright, the committee decided to recommend a macadam road from Victoria bridge to Horton street on Ridout, and on Horton street from Ridout to Richmond. The London street railway, on the engineer's instructions, had raised the tracks there, and it was necessary to fix up the roadway.

On the motion of Ald. Mitchell, it was recommended that a brick pavement be initiated on Talbot street from York to King streets.

Other routine business was transacted. Those present were Ald. Cooper (chairman), Ald. Saunders, Ald. Mitchell, Ald. Morgan, City Engineer Wright.

## WEBSTER CLAIM SETTLED

Deserter From Whaler Wanted Millions From New Zealand Government.

Auckland, New Zealand, July 28.—The Governor, in opening Parliament yesterday, announced that the claim for land purchased by William Webster, a deserter from a whaler, from Maoris, in the Auckland district prior to the proclamation of British sovereignty, has been satisfied and settled with the United States Government.

William Webster, who was known in Auckland as the "King of Waiata," at one time had in his possession land in Auckland Province valued at \$2,500,000. He was dispossessed of the lands by Governor Hobson in 1841. He sent a claim from San Francisco, where he resided for a time, and later made another claim for compensation through the Washington Government. Sir Robert Stout, who was commissioned to investigate the case by the New Zealand Government, reported against the claimants in 1909.

### A PORT STANLEY COMPLAINT.

To the Editor:

Being a Port Stanley for the last ten years, I respectfully wish to call attention to the dilapidated picnic park at the Port, and known as "Fraser Heights."

During the several years in which it has been my pleasure to visit here, never before have I seen the picnic grounds in such a deplorable condition as they are at the present time. They are, to say the least, a disgrace to those responsible.

One of the various exhibits of the grounds is composed of the unsightly remnants of what was at one time a respectable bandstand, scattered in an exceedingly disgraceful manner throughout the park, while the bandstand site is recognized by a number of broken and decayed posts, which have remained undisturbed since the destruction of the stand.

Mingled with this junk are the broken benches which add greatly to a most unwholesome scene.

The system in vogue for the burning of lunch boxes, etc., cannot be condemned too strongly. This consists of a plot of ground fenced off, lying close to the merry-go-round, in the most conspicuous place on the hill.

If very much more of the boulevard along the driveway through the grounds, was torn away, the only method remaining to repair it would necessarily consist of an entirely new fence.

Among the few things which remain the same as they were ten years ago are the maddening records of the merry-go-round.

The condition of the "Inverness Hotel" and its grounds is excellent, so why should the picnic park attached to the hotel, not maintain its old time reputation and respectability?

I might also mention that the refuse thrown overboard the steamer "Forest City" creates a nuisance along the beach, and especially to the bathers.

## BRUTAL PARENTS WELL PUNISHED

### A Montreal Couple Given Ten Years for Cruelty to Their Child.
