CHAMPION WOLGAST NOW IN NO DANGER

Operation for Appendicitis Is Successful and Fighter Is Resting Easy.

BOUT IS NOW POSTPONED

Title Battle With Freddie Welsh, Billed For This Afternoon, Is Off For Months.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 29.—Early this morning the Clara Barton Hospital matron announced that Ad Wolgast was asleep, resting easily, and that his condition was much improved.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 29.—Stricken suddenly with acute appendicitis, Ad Wolgast, champion lightweight, underwent an operation today, on the eve of his scheduled 20-round battle with the British challenger, Freddie Welsh. The operation apparently was successful, but the patient will be in the hospital for ten days or two weeks, and for three months his surgeons have warned him that he must not put on a boxing glove.

Wolgast was under the knife forty minutes. Dr. J. W. Pollard, the surgeon who performed the operation, declared that his splendid physical condition would pull Wolgast through in fine shape and his fighting powers would be unimpaired. Wolgast was placed on the operating table at 9 p.m. Although doubled up with pain, he smiled cheerfully just before the surgeons applied the ether cones.

Shown Symptoms Early. The little champion showed symptoms of the sudden attack last night after he had eaten a hearty supper at his training quarters. Slight pains caused him to complain, but he went to bed at 10:30, apparently all right again. At 2 o'clock, however, his manager, Tom Jones, said Ad awakened him with screams.

Physicians diagnosed the attack as acute appendicitis and declared that an immediate operation was necessary. The announcement was made at the hospital. Jones rushed out to fetch Mrs. Wolgast. When she arrived at the hospital she broke down.

"This is the first time Ad has ever been ill," she said, "and I am so afraid these knives will kill him. The announcement of the illness had the effect of a bolt of lightning upon sports circles. Yesterday he appeared in the pink of condition, and fight enthusiasts who saw him wrestle and pummel his sparring partners and cavort with the club's mascot, were anxious to learn that he was in a hospital this morning at the point of death.
