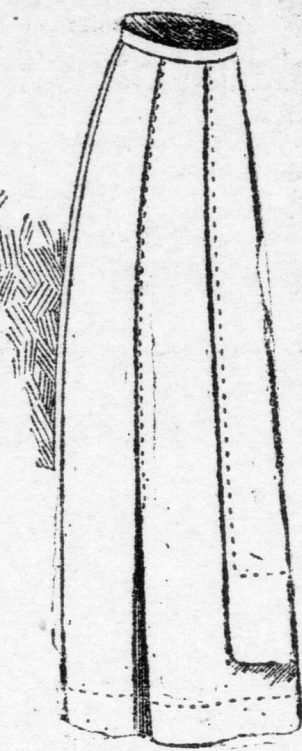

TAYLOR GIVEN THREE MONTHS

East End Lad Sentenced for Theft in the Police Court Today.

A GOOD CHARACTER

Former Employer Stated That He Had Found the Prisoner To Be Absolutely Honest.

Victor Taylor, who pleaded guilty in police court a few days ago to a charge of stealing approximately \$100 in collections from his employer, W. J. Crocker, a butcher, of Dundas street east, was this morning sentenced to three months in the county jail on each of three charges, by P. M. Judd. The terms will be served concurrently, however.

Taylor was again unable to explain what he did with the money, and stated that while he was heartily and sincerely sorry, he had no excuse to offer. He also gave his promise to pay back the money in installments at the completion of his term.

Mr. McMillen, of Evelyn, who employed Taylor on a stage route for five years before he came to London, was present in court, and stated that he had always found the boy very honest and a conscientious worker. The lady with whom he boarded also spoke very well of him, and stated that she had never known him to conduct himself wrongly before.

Under the circumstances the court decided to impose a lenient sentence.

When arrested Taylor had \$14.52 in his possession, and the court was asked to make out an order to have the cash handed over to Mr. Crocker. Taylor, however, asked the court to allow him to retain a part of the money, which comprised his last earnings, that he may have something with which to pay his board for a few

days until he obtains employment on his release in May.

The magistrate, therefore, ordered that only \$7 be paid to the complainant.

MRS. ROSANNA WHITE DIED VERY SUDDENLY

Mother of Mrs. William Milroy, of London, Stricken With Heart Failure.

Aylmer, Feb. 7. — Mrs. Rosanna J. White, relict of the late Capt. W. W. White, and mother of Mrs. Wm. Milroy, of London, died very suddenly of heart failure at her home here this morning shortly after 3 o'clock. On Sunday evening she was unexpectedly taken with a fainting spell. Apparently she had recovered and was enjoying her usual health, when she died this morning. Mrs. White had been a resident of Aylmer for 40 years. She was 68 years of age, and is survived by two sons and one daughter—William, of the C. P. R. at Winnipeg, and James, of the Bell Telephone Company, also of Winnipeg, and Mrs. Wm. Milroy, of London. Mrs. White was born in Port Burwell. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

ARM WAS BROKEN BY A WATERPIPE

Brakeman W. J. Hunter, of London, Hurt at Hamilton.

Brakeman W. J. Hunter, of this city, who runs on a Grand Trunk freight out of London, suffered a painful accident at Copetown on Tuesday afternoon, when his arm was broken in two places by contact with a water standpipe near the tracks.

He was brought to this city on express No. 3, and attended by Dr. H. A. Stevenson. Hunter was out on his run, and while the train was proceeding at a fairly rapid rate, had occasion to hold out his arm at the side of the car in signalling. As he did so, the member struck the standpipe and was smashed in two places.

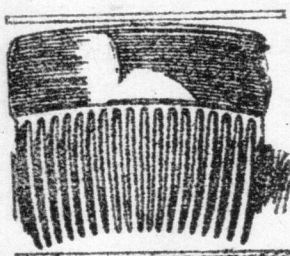

LONDON CLUB RINKS WIN TANKARD GAME

The London Curling Club won its group in the Western Ontario Tankard preliminaries by 15 shots, defeating two rinks of Ingersoll curlers, who were the only rinks to show up. Hensall and Embro rinks defaulting. The games were played at the London Club rinks yesterday afternoon, and while one of the Ingersoll rinks succeeded in winning out by three shots, after a very strenuous game, the other rink was badly defeated by the quartette skipped by Dr. Bentley, and a record score was piled up, the London rink winning out by no less than 18 shots.

A GREAT STRUGGLE.

The McKay-Summer game was a hard struggle, both rinks performing in great style, and as end after end was played the score was pretty much even. Almost down to the last end were the two rinks tied, but then Skip Summer's rink drew away, and while one of the Ingersoll rinks succeeded in winning out by three shots, after a very strenuous game, the other rink was badly defeated by the quartette skipped by Dr. Bentley, and a record score was piled up, the London rink winning out by no less than 18 shots.

ON THE OTHER RINK, HOWEVER,

the visitors were playing in very hard luck, and Skip Bentley, whose rink was playing splendidly, had little trouble in winning out. It was a well-played game, despite the one-sidedness of the score, and the players enjoyed it. It is not known definitely when the second round of the Tankard series will be played.

BIG BONSPIEL THURSDAY.

On Thursday afternoon the members of the London Club will hold their weekly bonspiel. Four ebony-backed military hair brushes have been donated for the winning rink by Mr. John Marr, and as a result there will be keen rivalry amongst the members to see who wins the brushes. The draw will be made at the rink on Thursday morning, and the proceedings will start at 3:30 o'clock, continuing until the final game is played. Lunch will be served at the supper hour as usual, and an enjoyable time will be held.

Owing to the popularity of the bonspiels that the London Club have been putting on this year, the members have decided to hold them weekly instead of fortnightly as in the past. The ice at the rink is in splendid condition, and there is nothing lacking in the way of enthusiasm and rivalry between the different

ships to make the affair a success.

LONDON CLUB'S GREAT SUCCESS

The London Club rinks are making a splendid showing this year, and it promises to be the most successful year in the history of the club. There is no doubt but what curling is fast increasing in popularity in London, and the membership rolls of both the London and the Thistle Clubs are fast increasing. In no city of its size in the Dominion has there been as much curling and as many bonspiel events as in London this season, and the city is fast gaining a reputation as one of the curling centres of Canada.

The Scotch curlers who were here last week were delighted with the treatment accorded them by the local rinks, and many of them stated while here that nowhere had they seen such enthusiasm or interest in the game as here.

GETTING BEHIND T. R.

Amos Pinchot Deserts LaFollette's Standard for That of Colonel.

New York, Feb. 7. — Amos Pinchot, brother of Clifford Pinchot, and heretofore one of the LaFollette leaders in the east, has transferred his allegiance to the Roosevelt standard. "LaFollette's withdrawal," he says in explanation of his position, "leaves his followers free to get behind Roosevelt, and continue the old fight with another leader. Many LaFollette men feel that Roosevelt is not as advanced in his progressiveness as LaFollette. But it is clear that LaFollette and Roosevelt are agreed on most fundamental points.

"LaFollette's withdrawal was the only sure means of uniting all the progressiveness and of insuring the nomination of some progressive."
