THE WAR SITUATION

London, Nov. 18 .- To the south and centre of the Tchataldja lines the Bulgarians again pressed their attack today and, according to the Turks, were again thrown back. Monastir, the last stronghold of the Turks in Macedonia,

surrendered today to the combined Servian and Greek armies, after a bloody struggle. The Sultan is said personally to have appealed to the pow-

The battle for the Tchataldja lines began early today, in front of the Turkish centre. There, Mahmoud Mukhtar, the Turkish commander, led out his troops in a spirited frontal attack through heavy fire from the Bulgar artillery, and, according to Ottoman reports, broke up the Bulgarian formation, flung the invaders back in confusion, and captured several guns. At the southern end of the lines hot fighting then developed

and here, too, the Turks claim the victory. They say they had taken six batteries and four machine guns before nightfall. Fifty thousand men laid down their arms when Monastir surrendered today, and the Crown Prince of Servia entered at the head of his troops. Zekki Pasha, commander of the sixth Turkish army corps. and Djavid Pasha, who led his seventh corps to that important city after the defeat of the Turks at Uskub, together with Fethi Pasha, who was formerly Ottoman minister at Belgrade, handed over their swords to the con-
