London, Sept. 4.—The protest against the sale of the Glen Riddell manuscripts of Robert Burns, which were sold to an American collector by the Liverpool Athenaeum six weeks ago for \$25,000 has taken definite form in an action to restrain actual transfer of the manuscripts. Led by the poet's only surviving granddaughter, Annie Burns, of Cheltenham. She asks that as Robert Burns' nearest of kin, she be declared executrix of the hitherto unconfirmed personal estate of the Scotch bard. The action is lodged with the consent of the great-grandchildren of Robert Burns.

LEGAL TANGLE OCCURS OVER SQUATTER'S LAND

North Dorchester Case Required a Year To Be Straightened Out.

A somewhat intricate legal tangle, involving the title to a 200-acre tract of land on the second concession of North Dorchester, has last night been through the sale of a portion of it, 35 acres in extent, being part of lot 14, south of the river.
Mr. Alfred E. Malpass has just completed the purchase of that portion of the property from Mr. Daniel E. Spring after negotiations lasting over a year, during which time Mr. E. W. Scatcherd, acting as their solicitor, has been endeavoring to secure a clear title to the land. The land, it appears, was never at any time patented by the Government, and all the people living on it were, in the strictly legal sense, squatters, who at least they were until a few years ago, when a change in the statutes governing the question was made. Under the present law, persons, if allowed to occupy such land 65 years, have legal possession, the Government's claim being barred.
The portion of land in question was originally taken up by two brothers, Englishmen, by the name of Rowsell. One brother died and his wife and family removed to England. The other brother deeded the land, not knowing the complications in which it was involved. None of the succeeding titles to the land have been valid on account of the fact that the share of the wife and children of the deceased brother have never been accounted for, and the signature of his heirs had not been obtained. Mr. Scatcherd located the family in England and secured the necessary papers, and the land for the first time is now in the legal possession of its owner, being able to make title for the 65 years necessary to bar the claim of the Canadian Government.

DR. JARVIS HONORED

Elected President of Canadian Institute of Homoeopaths.

The Canadian Institute of Homoeopathy met this week for a two-days' session at Grace Hospital, Toronto. There were the usual number of papers presented. Dr. Friedmann and his lecture received some attention at the hands of those present, all greatly lamenting that the hopes for satisfactory results were not realized. As for serum treatment and vaccines generally, they were willing to accept curative results as instances of homoeopathic action, but would not hold homoeopathy responsible for any harmful effects, which they contended did not belong to pure homoeopathic action. The officers elected for this year are: President—Dr. C. E. Jarvis, London, advanced from vice-president. Vice-President—Dr. Schuarr, Berlin. Secretary—Dr. E. K. Richardson, Toronto, re-elected. The officers compose the executive. Dr. Hamilton Evans, of Toronto, the retiring president, and Dr. Tyrrell, of Toronto, were elected honorary presidents. The time and place for the next meeting rests with the executive.

POPE AGAIN ILL

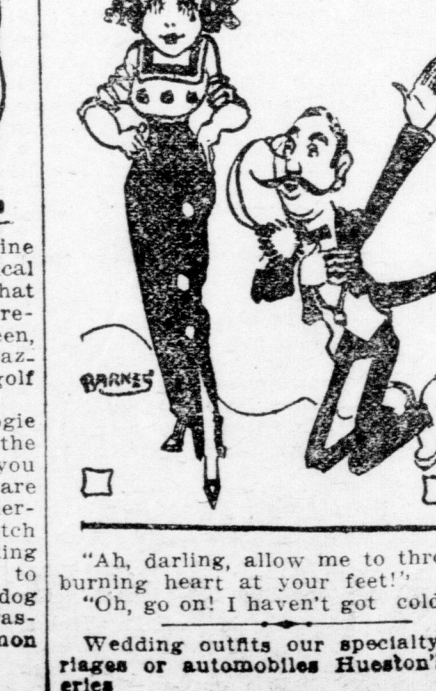
Has Recurrence of Serious Illness of Last Spring.

Rome, Sept. 4.—Pope Pius X. is again suffering from a slight indisposition, somewhat similar to the serious illness through which the aged pontiff passed last spring. At the Vatican it is said that his present trouble is due to a cold, but it has brought on hoarseness, headache and a slightly rising temperature, the present time. The doctors have suggested a complete rest. His holiness, however, insisted upon keeping engagements he had made for today, and he received in audience Cardinal Ferrari, of Milan, who headed a body of Milanese pilgrims. The Pope afterwards appeared before the pilgrims themselves and welcomed them to Rome.

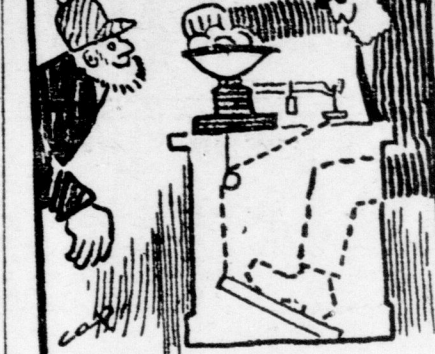
