CHICAGO, Nov. 5. - Club owners of the American League in their annual meting here today put themselves on record in favor of peace, but except for expressing their sentiments individually and informally, they brought no nearer the end of the baseball war. vidually and as a woole, agreed that the only way to eliminate the Federal League trouble was by absorption, as there was no room for a third major league," they agreed, and the elimina-tion of the competing clubs in Chi-cago, St. Louis and brooklyn must be

As for the New York club, Frank Farrell, its president, declared emphatically to the newspapermen that the Yankees are not for sale, It was said, too, that no discussion of the proposed transfer had taken place in the meeting. Delay in the arrival of Farrell gave rise to rumors that a discussion of the Chance matter was taking place in his absence.
