Transit lines, except the subways, were demoralized and every subway train was mobbed at the rush hour. At the stations the crowds overflowed into the streets. Long lines of surface cars are stalled in all parts of the city, as well as innumerable trucks, drays, motor buses, automobiles and taxicabs. Mayor Hylan has issued a proclamation calling upon all persons engage! tion calling upon all persons engaged in the transportation business, except in the delivery of foodstuffs, coal and milk to cease work until Tuesday and turn their trucks and men over to the city to meet the storm emergency.

Wages of 75 cents to \$1 an hour offered for snow shovellers tempted only 3,000 men, where 14,000 are needed. A call for volunteers led to many girl students in Barnard College offering their services. They shovelled man-fully.

The health department is alarmed at The health department is alarmed at the prospect. Walkinz with dry feet is impossible, and garbage removal has been interrupted. Householders have been asked to help by clearing walks. There is no danger of a food shortage. Milk trains arrived irregularly and deliveries are hour late.

Dozens of persons were injured today by falling copings, awnings and cornices, carried down by the weight of snow upon them. Lieut.-Col Frederick Davison, stationed at Governors Island, was killed by the falling of a glass canopy.

RAILWAY RATES TO **BE INCREASED SOON** TO OFFSET LOSSES

Advance To Be Made On Government Operated Lines in Near Future.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—(By the Canadian Press.)—Faced with a loss of approximately \$30,000,000 during the present financial year, it is regarded here as inevitable that rates of government railway lines will have to be increased. The increases in rates authorized some time ago do not, it is claimed, meet the ever-increasing cost of materials and operation. Before the United States Government hands back United States lines to their owners, it is calculated that there must be a large increase in their rates—an increase is calculated that there must be a large increase in their rates—an increase estimated by some railwaymen as high as 30 or 40 per cent. If such an increase is granted to United States lines it is asserted there will need to be a similar increase in Canada.

While final figures will not be available for some weeks, it is estimated that the loss on the whole Canadian national railway system will be in the neighborhood of \$19,000,000. To that has to be added an estimated loss of \$9,000,000 on the Grand Trunk Pacific. On the Canadian Northern alone, the loss is estimated at roughly \$10,000,000.

PREDICTS GREAT OIL **ACTIVITY IN CANADIAN** DURING YEAR

Land Surveyor Looks For Strikes in Alberta Province.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—That the greatest oil activity in the history of the northwest will take place in 1920 was the opinion expressed by Mr. A. G. Stewart of Edmonton, who is attending the annual meeting of the Association of Dominion Land Surveyors. Already prospectors are gathering in Edmonton making ready for spring operations, he said, and the effect of the "oil boom" of six years ago, which dod so much to harm the legitimate operations and which made sensible men look rather askance at the promotion of any oil schemes, is dying out.

The operations at the Peace River Crossing are attracting great attention where oil has already been struck. These have had to be abandoned for the time, however, owing to the wells being flooded with brine water, which will take a considerable time to clear. Any man who has travelled the country north of Edmonton, and who knows anything about oil signs, he said, is not orrly convinced, but certain that oil will be struck and plenty of it.

Four Good Reasons for a National Forward Movement

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

ESPITE the four years' fury of War, and the year of uncertainty just ended, the people of Canada have prospered. Yet, spiritual glories revealed to us in the great Conflict are being clouded by drifts of class-hostility, mutual suspicion and cynical materialism.

The world is troubled. Old conceptions are giving place to new. Yet, the Kingdom of God remains, firmly grounded on the great principle of love. It has the one remedy for a world diseased:—"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved."

Five Christian Communions-Anglican, Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian-call their various constituencies and the whole nation to a livelier and more sacrificial Christianity. They are making a great financial appeal. It is fitting that the public should know the reasons.

The Decline of the Dollar

The sharp rise in prices the world over has affected injuriously the position of

every man working for a fixed salary. Missionaries are in this category. Stipends that were ample in 1900, and nearly adequate in 1912, are utterly insufficient in 1920. There has been no general increase in these stipends. There cannot be, until the Canadian people scale-up their giving to balance the decline in purchasing-power of the Canadian dollar.

International exchange has been unstable. Money for export has been subject to heavy discounts. In view also of the increased cost of materials and of labor, any new building programme abroad has been out of the question. But the need for new buildings is imperative. Some missionaries are living in clay-floored huts.

New Standards Synods, the Bapare Necessary tist Conventions,

The Anglican the Congrega-

tional Union, the Methodist Conferences, and the Presbyterian General Assembly, have set new standards for the salaries of Clergymen actively engaged in Canada. But, for the Missionaries, and for the Superannuated Ministers, no increases have been possible.

One of the aims of the Forward Movement is to show the fine-spirited, generous, Christian people of Canada that the old standards of giving for Missions must be revised. It is impossible to maintain existing stations, even on a pre-War basis, without more men and much more revenue.

7 The Call

Coincident with this financial difficulfrom Abroad ty, new and glorious opportunities for the

extension of Christian teaching have appeared. In India, literally millions of "outcastes" are pleading for Missionary preachers and doctors. In China, a new National spirit has been born. Missionary teachers are urgently required to help formulate the National system of education. Hospitals, Missionary nurses, doctors and dentists, are heartily welcomed by the people. From Japan, Africa and the Islands of the Sea, comes the same story. .

The Home Responsibility

Here in Canada, the work of evangelizing Indians and Eskimos must

now be undertaken wholly by the Canadian Church. The rapid growth of our cities, the expansion of the West, the great immigration of the last twenty years, and the depopulation of rural areas, make a fourfold problem which can be solved only by radical readjustments of policy and greatly increased resources of men and money.

The Pressure on cline of the dollar the Colleges

has created difficulties in financing the Colleges and Universities established and maintained for the training of the Clergy. Last year, one College which had been able before the War barely to subsist, faced an additional charge for coal alone of \$1600. All other expenditures have risen in like proportion. Christianity has been the mother of Higher Education. A thoroughly trained Ministry is the great need of the times.

The men of faith, filled with the Holy Ghost, who proclaim the Gospel story by the frozen Coppermine, beneath the cone of Fujiyama, along the banks of the Yangtse and the Ganges are the product of our Canadian Colleges. There the Vision first appeared to them. The Church must stand behind these institutions.
