

WILL ACT IN JUNE FOR EQUALIZATION

County Council Delays Move—Committee Will Be Named Today.

WHARTON IS BACKED

Councillor William Boler was very late, and Thomas Elliott did not show up at all at the evening session of the Middlesex council last night, and the promised "raising" of High Constable Wharton's salary failed to materialize.

Moore, Boler and Elliott were not satisfied with the report of the finance committee which dealt with the salary question at the afternoon session and sent it back for salary pruning.

The same report was read last night and passed without a murmur, owing to the absence of Mr. Boler. Spectators, who had expected flights of oratory, were doomed to disappointment as far as the salary question was concerned, but Mr. Boler had considerable to say about taxation in Westminster township and was finally brought to order by Warden McPherson.

Delay Equalization.

Equalization of the county assessment will not take place until the June session of the council.

On motion of Councillors Bevercraft and Pike, the equalization committee members were asked to name a committee of five to equalize the assessment of the entire county and to base it on the assessed values as shown by the different assessors' rolls of the municipalities, or other assistance they might deem necessary to make a fair valuation of every individual municipality and report at the June session.

Councillor Cousins wanted to know how much had been collected in fines the year before. Mr. Wharton was appointed County clerk Stuart reported that the fines in 1923 amounted to but \$50. Under Mr. Wharton's regime, they had advanced to \$177.

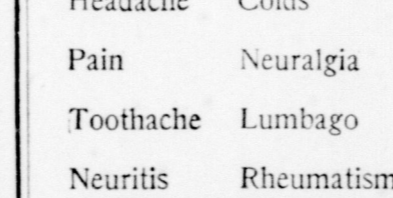

Perhaps the prettiest scene of all was success of the carnival, which was presented under the patronage of Dr. Frank Bryant and the teachers of the school, was due to the excellent direction the children received from Mrs. H. For the most part the children were smaller. A remarkable thing about the whole production was the fact that every the tiniest child could be heard distinctly throughout the house, so perfectly did they speak their lines.
