What Chance has Dempsey against man the size of Jess Willard? Weight hasn't always come out on top, and this is more true among heavyweights, in the past, than in any other division. Our greatest heavyweights have been at their best around the 200 pound mark.

John I. Sullivan at 190 pounds was in prime fighting condition. Joe Corbett took his measure tipping the beam at 185. Fitzsimmons best Corbett and won the championship weighing only 160 at the time. Jim Jeffries weighed 205 when he fought Fitz. and Johnson was t his

best round 200. He tipped 200 when Willard defeated him at Havana. Joe Blowski hit Jim Jeffries the hardest blow he ever got in his life. Willard at Havana weighed 243 pounds stripped, and was lean as a greyhound at that. Such a huge bulk puts him in a weight class ahead

of all former titleholders, except Jeffries, who was probably at his best when he fought Munroe, weighing 230. Willard was very fast when he fought Johnson, had unlimited endurance, and was a skillful boxer. When he won the championship he was a great fighter but he has fought only one battle since, defeating John

son four years ago, and he is past 35. What chance has Dempsey? He has the chance that virile youth gives him and it's a big one. He is aggressive and this is a decision fight. He is fast, a born fighter with 193 pounds to lean, hard muscle and a ring record that gives proof of their terrific driving power.
