## SYRIANS HAVE UNPLEASANT TIME

Barred From Canada By In-  
fraction of Law—Fight to  
Enter.

Early in the fall a little band of Syrians who had travelled from the borders of the Holy Land to settle in Canada were threatened with expulsion because of a breach of technical immigration laws. Immigrants who had been admitted to Canada by the Syrian consular agent in Montreal, who had travelled to the city to form new homes among friends and relatives who had already settled here, were placed under lock and key, there to await in "crowded and unconducive quarters" some word of immigration from the Canadian authorities regarding their eligibility as future Canadian citizens.

The reason, it is alleged, that these people, who came from distant Beirut, were held up, is because they did not come to Canada direct from their home land. The leader of the band, Said Kassar, by name, explained that the agent in Syria was unable to obtain a "continuous passage" ticket, which had forced them to change at Montreal. This, it appears, constituted a serious breach of the Immigration Act and in consequence the little band was ordered from Canada.

Mr. Thomas, hearing of the predicament of his fellow-countrymen, hurried to Quebec. Upon his arrival there, he found that they had secured the services of Mr. E. Champoux, a Quebec lawyer, and were endeavoring through legal channels to secure their return to their native land.

Mr. Thomas further learned that the party was under the leadership of Said Kassar, a Syrian of some forty odd years and possessor of considerable wealth and a fine education, being able to speak French, English, Italian and Arabic. They had passed every necessary test for the new settlers in this country, including that of medical examination, which was passed with flying colors, as all members of the party were pictures of health.

They were bound for a Syrian colony in the region of Lac du Bonhomme, Maine, which district gets very few immigrants. The party requested Mr. Thomas assistance and he immediately set to work.

Those who assisted Mr. Thomas in the case were John Champoux, father of the lawyer, Senator Balducci, Mr. Bailey and Rev. Father Caginan. After further conference on the matter it was deemed advisable to approach the immigration department making the case as one of a family.

Despite the efforts of their friends the party was ordered on Nov. 14, to return home on the S. S. Maine which they had but three days to catch.
