Prohibition in the Home Land Overseas
The annual meeting of the National British Women's Temperance Association was held in May in England. The Countess of Carlisle presided. Among several important resolutions adopted the following was one:— proposed by Miss Swankie-Cameron, and seconded:—"That this Council view with profound regret the action of members of the House of Commons in using their privileges to escape from the restrictions in the sale of alcoholic liquor which have been imposed, owing to national necessity, on the whole of the rest of London. This failure on the part of those to whom we should look for guidance, to take their share in this effort to diminish the evil of intemperance, has produced an unfortunate impression throughout the country. We therefore call upon the members of the House of Commons to follow the King's example and to submit to regulations imposed on others, by suspending the sale and use of alcoholic liquors in the refreshment rooms and bars of the House of Commons."

It was agreed that a copy of this resolution be sent to members of Parliament. Important addresses were delivered to the N.B.W.T.A. delegates, of whom there were 878 present. Perhaps the most timely were those on Venereal Diseases by Sir Thomas Barlow, and National Economy from the Temperance viewpoint by Major R. Rigg. Sir Thomas Barlow never expressed a truer idea than "that all social questions had the best chance of solution when men and women worked side by side."

He also referred to the "conspiracy of silence" which unfortunately exists on this subject. The Royal Commission on Venereal Diseases, which Sir Thomas represented, have arrived at the conclusion that one-tenth of city populations in Britain are affected with syphilis; gonorrhoea is greater. This disease is aggravated by alcohol in small quantities.

National Economy from the Temperance View
Major R. Rigg, representing the National War Saving Committee, said that a golden opportunity was lost when Parliament refused the fine lead of the King. We might say the same of our Dominion Parliament. Its membership is the same as that of the Dominion prohibition was not enforced. How short sighted men are anyway.

In 1915, in Britain, one hundred and eighty million pounds were spent on drink. The British nation drinks the value of a super-Dreadnought every five days. 31 Dreadnoughts and 38 battleships could be replaced at the cost of one year's drinking liquor. 70 million bushels of grain are yearly destroyed on the manufacture of beer and spirits. If made into bread this grain would produce 1,250,000,000 4 lb. loaves of good bread—enough to feed all Britain for more than four months.

The average expenditure on alcoholic drinks in Britain is over six shillings and sixpence per family per week. If every family in the land were to cut down their drink bill by one-half and invest the savings in this one item in Exchange Bonds or War Saving Certificates, the amount would be ninety million pounds per annum.

These facts we call from Major Rigg's address. Lady Carlisle pronounced it "a most splendid stirring speech." However, she gave a well put reminder of the great benefit of the women's Temperance Movement in thanking Major Rigg, and prompted laughing applause by suggesting that the War Saving Propaganda might lay more stress on the use of tobacco. Lady Carlisle also suggested to Major Rigg the importance of his committee being brave in condemning racing, hunting and various other follies. When the women saw the great appeals to give up innoxious things, naturally they considered it would be the correct thing to condemn those in high positions who still cling to drinks, smoking expensive cigars, and an indulgence of amusements.

ANOTHER BRITISH VICTORY OBTAINED

U. S. Courts Hand S. S. Appan Back to the British

Norfolk, Va., July 29.—Federal Judge Waddill to-day decided the libel proceeding for possession of the captured British liner Appan in favor of the English owners, and against the German prize crew which brought her here.

The court held that the German government lost all legal claim to the Appan and her cargo as prizes of war when Lieutenant Berg and his prize crew on last February arrived brought them into the neutral waters of Hampton Roads, with the intention of "laying up" the vessel indefinitely.

WAR HAS LITTLE EFFECT ON CROWN LAND REVENUE

Total Cut 240,000,000 Feet—Bathurst Lumber Company Heads The List

The revenue from the New Brunswick Crown Lands is remaining up to normal despite the conditions resulting from the war.

To-day, August 1st is the last day for the payment of the stumpage accounts to the Department of Lands and Mines, and according to the estimate given the Frederick Gleason Saturday by Deputy Minister T. G. Loggie, \$352,624.76 will be paid in stumpage to the province by the lumbermen this year.

This amount, while smaller than last year is larger than was expected a year ago, as it was freely predicted that the lumber cut in New Brunswick this year would be at least forty per cent less than normal. Conditions improved, however, as is shown by the fact that the cut last winter actually was about 240,000,000 feet which is 50,000,000 feet less than in the previous winter—a decrease of about twenty-five per cent. The falling off in the cut last winter was particularly noticeable on the Southwest Miramichi, where the operations were considerably smaller than for some years past. The Bathurst Lumber Company says the largest stumpage this year, their account being \$67,193.65, while other large amounts will be received from the Richards Manufacturing Company, \$313,144; Shives Lumber Company, \$25,190.57; J. B. Snowball Company, \$21,305.17, and Dominion Pulp Company, \$17,871.92.

NEW BRUNSWICK LOSES CHIEF JUSTICE

Sir Pierre A. Landry Passed Away At His Home, Dorchester, On Friday.

Sir Pierre Amand Landry, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, died at his residence, Dorchester, at six o'clock Friday morning. He had been ailing for several months and, while his death was not unexpected, the end came suddenly. With him at the end were his daughter, Miss Marie Landry, and two sons, Dr. A. Raymond Landry, M. D., of Moncton, and Allan J. of Halifax.

Sir Pierre had reached the age of seventy years and is survived by one daughter, Miss Marie Landry of Dorchester, and six sons—Pierre A. and William, both on active service at the front; Hector L., of Edmonton, barrister; John C., of Edmonton, barrister; A. Raymond, M. D., of Moncton, and Allan J., of Halifax.

He was a Conservative in politics and in religion a Catholic. He was well respected and his death cast a gloom over the province. Flags were raised on all the public buildings in respect to the memory of one of Dorchester's foremost sons. The funeral was held from his late residence this morning and the body was taken to St. Thomas' church, St. Joseph's, Westmorland county, where services were held. Interment was at St. Joseph's.
