Campaign For the BLIND

SUPPOSE YOU WERE

Suppose you, having come to adult years enjoying the priceless privilege of sight, were to be suddenly deprived without warning of this most valuable of all senses.

Suppose you could no longer discern the fares of your loved ones; the brilliant azure of the sky at high noon; the deep red of the blush rose blooming in your garden.

Suppose you could not see your way across the room. We tell you on the authority of thousands of blind adults that all these deprivations, bitter as they would be, would not effect you as would the feeling that you were of no longer any use in the world. "I'm blind and no good!" that is the terrible feeling which makes

the blind miserable, hopeless, lost! But the cry of misery need no longer be heard. There is no reason now why even a man or a woman deprived of sight should not still become a useful, honored prosperous and happy citizen.

And it can be done. It is being done. In Halifax, a great work for the blind has been going forward for two years. The Maritime Branch of the Canadian National institute has for two years operated a workshop in Halifax where blind adults are trained to become self reliant, happy and useful citizens. Once we can achieve that, we have taken a great load of trouble from the shoulders of the afflicted blind.

"Help the Blind to Help Themselves"

The cost of operating this worshop is about \$2,000 a month. There

For two years the bulk of this cost has been borne by the Canadian National Institute, from funds supplied largely by the people

Nova Scotia owes Toronto a great deal more than money in this connection; Nova Scotia owes Toronto a debt which cannot rully be

discharged in money. We think that it is time Nova Scotia took the responsibility of the education of its own blind into its own hands. We feel that 't is not just or desirable, purely from the Nova Scotian viewpoint, to ask Ontario people to carry this responsibility for us.

You can bring these blind fellow citizens into the light of day

The increased cost of everything since the war period came upon us has made it impossible for this work which is being done to help the blind in Nova Scotia to be carried on without a public appeal

The School for the Blind is urgently in need of money, and money is needed at once to finance the instruction organizatio of the Canadian National Institute, which beside the workshop already mentioned has extensive courses in home has extensive courses in home instruction which must not be permit-

One of two things must now happen. Either the people of Nova Scotia will rally to the support of their blind fellow citizens or the splendid work which is being done for the blind in Nova Scotia must

The failure of the public to support the effort which is now being made to raise funds to carry on this valuable work will there must be fewer blind people in Nova Scotia educated of self-reliance and more of them condemned to suffer life in blind helplessness to whom Death will come as a wel The responsibility rests upon every citizen of Halifax this cause in some way. We expect with confidence that the wealthy men and women of our Province will support us to the utmost extent of their ability.

But this responsibility is not to be carried by the wealthy men and women alone. Citizens who are not so well blessed with worldly goods can help us, too. No contribution can be too large, and none is too area. is too small. Even those who cannot give money can give their friend-ship, their sympathy and their verbal support.
