Mr. Munro is the Professor of Law in Owens College, and though we have not had the pleasure of seeing anything before from his pen, we have no hesitation in saying that he has proved himself equal to his subject. His is no brief and hasty sketch. It is a learned and careful treatise, complete and authoritative. When we say that the whole constitution of Provinces and Dominion, the powers of all functionaries, the constitutional history, the division of Legislative power, etc. are all fully dealt with, we have given some idea of the scope of the book, which ought to be placed in the libraries of schools and colleges, and also in parliamentary and law libraries and reference libraries generally. We observe several valuable appendices, *e.g.*, complete lists of governors, the text of the B. N. A. Act, of the terms of Union of British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, etc.
