REV. MR. MEIKLE, the evangelist, is holding a series of meetings in Aylmer, Que.

THE Young People's Guild, of St. Andrew's church, Sarnia, have presented their retiring pastor, Rev. Mr. Macadam, with an elegant drawing-room chair and an address expressing regret at his departure from among them.

THE Ladies' Aid Society of Knox church, Shelburne, gave a concert under their patronage, in the Town Hall, on the evening of the 11th inst. It was a very successful affair. The hall was filled, the programme excellent, and the proceeds over \$50.

AT last communion of Knox church, Shelburne, held on Sept. 13th, seventeen new members were admitted. There were twenty-eight additions at the previous communion in June, a total of forty-five in the half-year, which is very encouraging to both pastor and people.

PREPARATORY services were held in Chalmers' church, Toronto, Rev. J. Mutch, pastor, on Friday evening, 13th inst., when fifty new members were received, this being the largest number received at one time in the history of this prosperous congregation. Rev. W. Reid, of Weston, preached the preparatory sermon.

REV. GEO. BRENNER, after eighteen years pastorate in White Lake congregation, preached his farewell sermon on Sabbath Oct. 13th. Mr. Brenner will settle near Brandon with his daughter Mrs. McTavish. A correspondent of a local paper says: "The sincere hope of his many friends here is that he may enjoy his well-earned rest, as he is retiring from active ministry."

THE Rev. J. McL. Gardiner, pastor of the Eramosa congregation, was presented with a purse of gold of the value of \$100 by the members of his congregation on the eve of his departure for California. The address, which accompanied the present, referred in very complimentary terms to Mr. Gardiner's zeal and abilities and the success which has crowned his labours in Eramosa.

THE first meeting this season of the Young People's Presbyterian Union, of Toronto, is to take the form of a grand social gathering, and will be held in Knox church, on Thursday evening, Nov. 14th when it is expected that addresses will be given by Mr. Hamilton Cassels on "The Unknown Young People in our Churches," and by Mr. McCullough, on "Our Young Friends Outside the Churches."

THE anniversary services in commemoration of the re-opening of Cooke's church, city, were conducted Sabbath morning, 13th inst., by Rev. Dr. Parsons, of Knox church, and in the evening by Rev. W. Briggs, D.D., of the Methodist Book Room. On Monday the annual social gathering of the congregation was held and a most enjoyable time was spent. The congregation is in a very flourishing condition.

ON Tuesday the 8th inst., the young people of St. Andrew's church, Sarnia, met and formed a Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour with the following officers:—Honorary President, Rev. John Thompson, D.D.; President, W. A. MacLean Esq.; Vice-President, Miss Porteous; Rec.-Secretary, Miss M. MacKenzie; Cor.-Secretary, Miss J. D. Brebner; Treasurer, Mr. Will King. The Society started with a membership of thirty-one active members and sixteen associate members.

THE usual monthly meeting of the Bradford Auxiliary W.F.M.S., was held on Tuesday 15th inst., a number of visitors from the Bond Head Auxiliary also being present. After the meeting an adjournment was made to the Fire Hall, where a social gathering was held to which a number of gentlemen specially interested in Mission work had been invited. After tea addresses were delivered by Rev. J. Carewell, Bond Head, Mr. James Wilson, Reeve of West Gwillimbury, Mr. W. Frazer, and others.

THE Rev. William A. Stewart, M.A., was duly ordained and inducted by the Orangeville Presbytery to the pastoral charge of the united congregations of Horning's Mills and Primrose, on the 11th inst. Rev. Mr. McClelland, Shelburne, presided, Mr. Ives preached, Mr. Smith addressed the newly inducted minister, and Mr. McNiel addressed the people. In the evening a reception was given to Mr. Stewart. After tea, in an adjoining hall, a fine programme of speeches were made by all the neighbouring ministers, and music by the choir was rendered.

ON Saturday afternoon last, the cornerstone of a new church in this city, to be known as the South-side Presbyterian church, and to be occupied by the recently-formed congregation of which R. V. Geo. Burnfield, B.D., is pastor, was laid on Parliament st., between Duchess and Queen streets. The building will be 72 feet by 42 and of solid brick and capable of seating 500 people. The total cost including site, will be \$10,000. The stone was laid by Mr. Burnfield, and after the ceremony addresses were delivered by R. V. Prof. MacLaren, Rev. Dr. Gregg, A. J. McMillan and others.

THE Presbytery of Sarnia has agreed to the translation of Rev. T. McAdam of Sarnia, who has been called to fill the chair of Logic, Mental and Moral Philosophy and Systematic Theology in Morrin College, Quebec. The rev. gentleman will be relieved of the charge of St. Andrew's congregation, Sarnia, on October 22nd. Rev. G. Cuthbertson will declare the church vacant on October 27th, and Mr. Anderson, of Nipin, will act as Moderator of the congregation during the

vacancy. A call was handed in to Rev. J. McIntock, of Mandaamin, from Guthrie and Wilkesport. Mr. McIntock expressed his desire to accept the call. The Presbytery agreed to his translation.

THE services in connection with the re-opening of Knox church, Perth, Rev. Jas. Ross, B.D., pastor, on the 6th inst., were conducted in the morning by Rev. A. H. Scott, of St. Andrew's; Rev. Mr. Laing (Baptist), in the afternoon, and Rev. Mr. Henderson (Methodist), in the evening. On the following Monday evening a social gathering of the congregation was held. The total plate collections on Sabbath amounted to \$265.00; while the proceeds of the Monday evening entertainment amounted to \$235.00. The congregation of Knox church have, during the past summer, wholly remodelled the inside of the church building, which has also been re-roofed, and modern heating appliances placed therein, and they now consider they have one of the most beautiful and comfortable churches in Ontario. On the north side of the church building a substantial and commodious house, two storeys high, is approaching completion. The cost of the improvements on the church is about \$5,700, while the building on the north side will cost between \$900 and \$1,000. Minard's Liniment is the Best.

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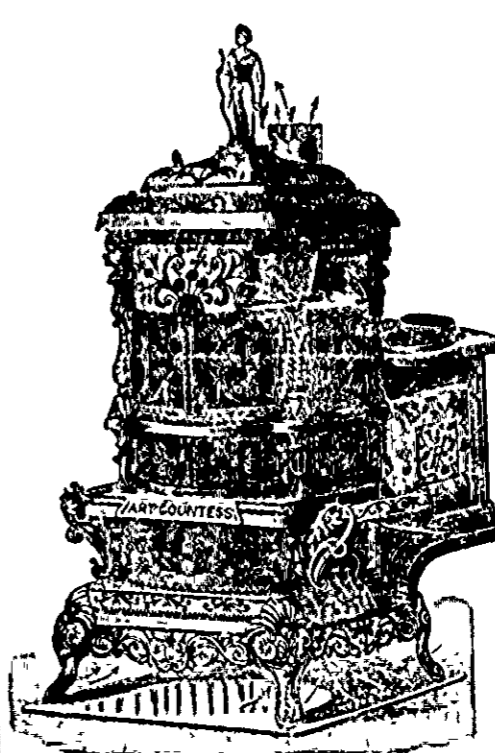
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
