be withdrawn and that we proceed in the usual fashion prescribed by rules that make for order, that make for discipline, and that make for freedom. If there is anything that tends more than anything else to throw power into the hands of the administration and those who are associated with them, it is disrespect for and departure from the long-established traditions and rules of this house. If we lightly depart from them, as unfortunately was the custom in the last three years following the war, we shall see confusion, and loss of dignity in this house and lack of respect for it, which I fear is already apparent.

Mr. Angus MacInnis (Vancouver East): Mr. Speaker, I do not rise to take part in this filibuster. This motion was introduced and spoken to by the right hon. Prime Minister (Mr. St. Laurent), who gave his reasons for it. It was spoken to by the leader of the opposition (Mr. Drew), who gave his reasons why he considered it was not necessary. It was spoken to by the leader of my party (Mr. Coldwell), who I believe very clearly put our case as to why we are supporting it. I cannot understand all this talk about the danger to order, about the danger to democracy, and all the other dangers that have been mentioned. Surely this is a question of orderly procedure in parliament, and whether we agree with it or not is a matter to be decided by the vote of parliament.

I think every hon. member, I suppose at least every hon. member on this side of the house, regrets that the government has felt it necessary to postpone the debate on the speech from the throne, or rather to postpone it if it is not finished by the end of next week. That is a longer time than the government suggested at first, and that in itself is one of the hallmarks of democratic procedure. There has been a compromise between the two extremes. If the government did not get all they expected to get or wished to get in the first instance, the opposition got at least some of what it wanted.

We will have a whole week to discuss questions which affect our own constituencies and I agree with the hon. member for Vancouver South (Mr. Green) and other hon. members that there are important questions that will have to be aired in this house. But I believe that the sooner we get this issue finished with the quicker we can come to questions that are important. If the question of Newfoundland is not important, we can come to questions that are.

I think it was the hon. member for Vancouver South who said that democracy was under attack. I cannot conceive of anything

that can bring democracy more into disrepute than futile discussions in the House of Commons.
