TERRORISM

TURKISH EMBASSY ATTACK—THREAT POSED BY ARMENIAN TERRORISTS

Mr. John Nunziata (York South-Weston): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Acting Prime Minister. On January 29 I was advised by the Canadian Security Intelligence Service that Armenian terrorists were the greatest and most serious threat to Canadian security. I was assured that the threat was being monitored very closely and that the Intelligence Service had considerable intelligence information on the matter. Will the Acting Prime Minister confirm that the Canadian Security Intelligence Service failed to provide this intelligence to the RCMP and, specifically, confirm that the CSIS failed to notify the RCMP of the urgent advance warning from the Turkish authorities?

Hon. Flora MacDonald (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, when the Deputy Prime Minister was asked questions about security at the Turkish Embassy last week, he indicated that there was a full investigation under way. That investigation is being completed. When the results are made known, the Deputy Prime Minister will report to the House.

ADVANCE WARNING INQUIRY

Mr. John Nunziata (York South-Weston): Mr. Speaker, will the Acting Prime Minister at least confirm today that that advance warning from Turkish authorities went to the CSIS and they in turn failed to pass that information on to the RCMP?

Hon. Flora MacDonald (Minister of Employment and Immigration): No, Mr. Speaker, I will not confirm that. I will take the question as notice and pass it on to the Minister responsible.
