"THE PINES", KENORA, ONTARIO

Question No. 433—Mr. Reid (Kenora-Rainy River):

1. Did the Department of the Solicitor General sign a contract with "The Pines" of Kenora, Ontario, for the provision of a halfway house for prisoners and, if so, on what date?

2. Did the Department agree to (a) pay an amount per occupant of "The Pines" and, if so, what amount (b) guarantee a number of occupants and, if so, how many?

3. Did the Department advance any moneys to "The Pines" over and above the amount referred to in part 2 and did it make any other cash advances?

4. During the period October 8, 1982 to August 31, 1983, what amount was paid to "The Pines"?

Hon. Bob Kaplan (Solicitor General of Canada): In so far as the Correctional Service of Canada (CSC) is concerned:

1. CSC renewed its contract with "The Pines" on April 1, 1983 for a period of one year.

2. (a) CSC pays a per diem rate of \$42.37 per federal offender placed in this Community Residential Centre (CRC). (b) CSC guarantees and pays for the use of a minimum of six beds per day.

3. The Pines Camp Board of Directors incurred a debt of approximately \$15,000 over the projected relocation costs of the Camp due to the necessity to construct a new road and to install a new septic system as per provincial standards. CSC advanced a payment of \$12,000 in the form of a loan while the Ontario Ministry of Correctional Services, made a \$3,000 loan contribution. This prepayment is being recovered by holding back 15 p. 100 of the monthly contract payments to the CRC until such time as the total amount is recovered. No other cash advance has been made.

4. During the period of October 8, 1982 to August 31, 1983 "The Pines" provided services to CSC for a total amount of \$64,798.14. However, 15 p. 100 of this amount was deducted towards the repayment of the \$12,000 cash advance.
