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HEAVY RAINFALL IN THE DAKOTAS

Wheat Declines Sharply in Response—Corn and Oats Also Sag.

CHICAGO, June 30.—General rains and cooler weather in the Dakotas, with prospects that Minnesota would be equally favored, had a bearish effect on wheat today. The market closed nervous at a decline of 3-4c to 1 1/2c net. Corn showed a loss of 3-4c to 1c from Saturday, and oats a fall of 1-8c to 1/2c. In provisions the outcome was an upturn of 2 1/2c to 7 1/2c.

Wheat was weak with July sagging more than other months. Most of the pressure on July came in a hedging way against purchases of new wheat to arrive, chiefly from Illinois, Indiana and Missouri. It was the more favorable crop outlook in the spring wheat states northwest, however, that had the greatest influence. About the only important rally resulted from an expert's opinion that South Dakota would not yield more than a half crop at best. Export sales here and at the seaboard made the final tone unsettled.

Corn tapered slowly, but account of scattered rains and better export prospects. There was also a big increase of the amount shown to be in store here and at other leading points.

Oats were subject to a number of flighty changes, due to elevators buying cash oats at the sample tables and reselling in the pit.

Covering by July shorts lifted provisions. Some of the advance was lost owing to talk of liberal deliveries tomorrow.

There was no actual change in the condition of the market for cattle since this day week, but on account of the continued warm weather there was a disposition on the part of buyers to operate less freely, and in consequence trade was slow. All the offerings consisted of graded stock, for which drovers were demanding as much as they did for picked lots of choice as well as for steers in full carload lots.

Choice steers in full carload lots sold at \$7.15 to \$7.25, and good stock sold at \$6.50 to \$6.75 per 100 pounds, and the top price paid for picked lots of choice was \$7.40. Common cattle and canners were more plentiful than they have been of late, and prices for such were fully 25c per 100 pounds lower.

There continues to be a weak feeling in the market for sheep, on account of the increased receipts, and prices since this day week have scored a further decline of 25c to 50c per 100 pounds. At this reduction the demand was good, and sales of ewe sheep were made at \$4.50 per 100 pounds, and lambs at \$4 to \$6 each. The trade in calves was active and sales of calves were made at \$10.40 to \$10.50 per 100 pounds.

SHOULD DEVELOP INLAND WATERS

Towns Interested in Big Scheme Will Ask Government to Act.

The interest of inland towns in the development of waterway transportation was evidenced at a meeting in the city hall yesterday of the executive of the Great Waterways Union. J. W. Lyon of Guelph presided.

One resolution adopted approved of the action of the Dominion Government in ordering the construction of a larger Welland Canal to be rushed. It expressed its appreciation of the determination of the government to bring the deepest draft freighters of the great lakes into Lake Ontario, and thus give industrial points on Lake Ontario equality in the competition of all other points on the great lakes.

Another resolution urged the government to arrange for the deepening

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
