Germany, Italy and many other powers that were known to be inimical to the welfare of North America.

BY MR. HAZEN:

Q. What form did their protests take? A. Articles in magazines, public speeches and so on.

BY THE CHAIRMAN:

Q. Could you give us any references to those articles or statements? A. I haven't them here at the moment but I could easily submit them.

BY MR. MacINNIS:

Q. I think that point is substantiated inferentially in the statement before us. I yould take it that it was.

WITNESS: In August of 1938 Technocracy presented specifications for the army, navy and air force to meet and repell any attempted attack from Atlantic or Pacific simultaneously, and charged that the military budgets of the U.S. and Canada were inadequate to produce on this continent a military machine that would repell invasion.

MR. MacINNIS:

Were they military men who prepared that statement? A. I can't give you any idea who prepared it. It was presented by members of the organization, of whom many are in the army, the navy and the air force of the United States.

BY MR. ROSS:

Q. Presented to whom? A. At that time it was in the form of a magazine article which was sent to every congressman and senator in the United States. I want to say that that was and still is one of the methods that the organization uses; that was, that any major statement they came out with was sent to every member of Congress and the Senate in the United States, and later when the organization became larger in Canada the same thing was carried out as far as it was possible.

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
