felves amidst the general confusion. In their language, " it was expedient to fet " fire to every corner of Europe, and to " deftroy all established governments, by an " eruption of the volcanic, sinciple of equa-" lity." To this policy we may attribute their declarations, that all other countries were unhappy, ignorant, fuperflitious, and enflaved; that " a great battle was to be " fought between errors and principles;" and that it was " the morning of reason dawn-" ing upon the earth." Their declamatory doctrines made fome progrefs; and they proceeded to iffue to all nations their folemn grant of universal fraternity, which was promulgated in all languages with great activity and expence.

§ 9. At the epoch of the declaration of war against these kingdoms and Holland, the people of the several governments of Europe, without exception, were in a dangerous state of serment. This had not arisen
