Rev. Dr. Ribourg, preaching at St. Alban's Cathedral Sunday evening, on "The Life of Service," said in part :



A man who is really great cannot help being a minister, a man who is a true minister cannot help being truly great. Man Can only be great in one way, and that is, that in the process of becom-ing great he shall ennoble and bless his fellows.

"Therefore, it is of the very essence of greatness that it is only attain-able by service—a man to be really great must have a great heart. He must be able to understand his fel-lows and to realize the wants and needs of the various classes of men and do all that is in his power to make the world around him better. Whosoever would be great among you let him be your minister, and whosoever would be chief among you let him be your servant." "It we could really begin to believe

that the essence of true greatness lay in ennobling, in lifting up and in blessing mankind and not in dominion and subjection of mankind to our power for our own selfish ends, there is no doubt that we should find that true social reform would have begun, and the dawn of a better day would be at hand.

at hand. "True Christianity cannot but ex-press itself in a life of service. There-fore the man who is in the world for the only purpose of gratifying his selfish ends is neither great nor religious.


