COUNTY HAILS WORLD'S PROPOSAL

Scheme to Give Commuters Suburban Service Meets Approval

It is a long time since anything in respect to better living conditions has caught on like Wednesday's story in "The World," showing how improved suburban railway service may now be obtained for nearby points around the city. That the suburban towns have been notoriously ill-served in the matter of transportation is common property, and the action of the senate in allowing the passage of the consolidated railway act after consistently opposing it is hailed with delight. Commutation rates such as prevail out of Montreal is what the people living around Toronto want and what they will now be able to get.

Out thru the town of Markham, Unionville, Stouffville, Agincourt, Louisa Hill, Woodbridge, Brampton, Streetsville and lots of other places the most inefficient local railway service is given, and all representations have been summarily turned down. Agincourt is better served than most of the nearby towns, but even here the service is bad.

The last passenger train into the city goes at 8.45 and out at 8.51, and this in spite of the fact that three other trains pass thru the town—one at 10 p.m., one at 11 and another at 12, but none of them slow up there, not even during the exhibition.

Will Be Taken Up. "I believe the movement outlined by "The World" on Wednesday morning will be taken up by our people with enthusiasm," said James Kennedy, a well-known resident last night. No opportunity is given us to attend any evening concert of anything of the kind in the city. A reduction in rates, coupled with better transportation, would add immensely to the comfort of living in the country, and will undoubtedly be acted upon.

"It is just what we want to improve living conditions," said A. L. Brown, a leading merchant of Unionville. "The service we get on the Grand Trunk is wholly inconvenient to a nearby point like this, the hours of running the trains inconvenient and the cost of traveling to the times a very heavy burden. The member for South York, Mr. Maclean, is deserving of great credit for his persistence in the matter and now that the act is passed we ought to get busy and put it right up to the board of railway commissioners."

Markham Interested. Markham village, three miles further up the line from Unionville, is greatly interested in the new turn of events, and James Malcolm, the well known insurance man, far famed bowler, and all round good sport, talking to "The World" last night, said, among other things: "Our village council meets on Friday night and I think we ought to take the matter up without delay even on the information we have at hand. The fact that we may get better railway transportation at commutation rates such as prevail in Montreal is just what we want. The service on the Grand Trunk is altogether too slow, the trains unsuitable and the fares too high. We ought to push it right along."

Locust Hill, Woodbridge and other points all tell the same story. The earliest G.T.R. train leaves Unionville at 8.30, arriving at the Union Station about 10.30, and the last train out leaves at 5 p.m.

DANFORTH PROTEST CLOSING OF COLERIDGE STREET

Both Danforth and East Toronto Residents Inconvenienced by Building.

A deputation of the Danforth Park and East Danforth Ratepayers' Associations waited upon the York township officials at the council office yesterday to protest against the closing of Coleridge avenue, a street running north of Danforth avenue one block west of Cedervale avenue.

D. McCarthy, convenor, pointed out that the street has been considered a right of way by the residents and has been used as such for a number of years.

At the present time the owner is erecting a store on the street inside the city limits facing on Danforth avenue and blocking the entrance. Mr. McCarthy said the East Danforth ratepayers are considering the advisability of issuing an injunction against the builders to stop the erection of the building.

W. C. Clark, township clerk, said the matter was one for the city of Toronto to decide, altho the road was a township road and promised to take the matter up with the city and members of council immediately.

Danforth View. Electric light for the district was the principal topic of discussion at the well-attended meeting of the Danforth Park Ratepayers' Association, held in Gledhill Mission, Gledhill avenue, Wednesday night. W. Curtis, president, occupied the chair.

The chairman stated that he had no doubt the Hydro people would move quickly regarding the installation of the light owing to the pressure brought to bear upon them by York township council and by the residents of the district.

The matter of the closing of Coleridge avenue, preventing direct access to Danforth avenue, was considerably debated and caused much adverse comment among the members. D. McCarthy pointed out that the question was one to be settled between the city and York township authorities.

"For some reason the city won't take over the property altho the works department has laid out the street and placed curbs thereon," said Mr. McCarthy. "The owners of the land are now excavating for the purpose of erecting buildings and the street will be permanently closed against the residents of the Danforth Park section who have up to the present used the street as a direct thoroughfare to Danforth avenue."

H. E. Rose, president, and Roy Hughes, secretary of the East Danforth Ratepayers' Association, were present from that organization to solicit the help of the members to urge upon the authorities to keep the street open.

It was decided to send a special delegation to York township council to request that prompt action be taken in this regard. Petition forms received from the York township council for the installation of the electric light were signed by over fifty percent of the residents and will be filed in by the remaining householders as quickly as possible.

W. Groh was elected vice-president in place of E. Everett resigned. Mr. Groh was also appointed delegate to the amalgamated association of ratepayers.

EARLSCOURT PLANT TREE IN ROYCE TO HASTEN PURCHASE
At the meeting of the Earlscourt Veterans at Belmont Hall last night a proposal was made in the name of the Earlscourt Veterans' Association that the Prince of Wales be asked to plant a tree in memory of the Earlscourt veterans in Royce park instead of Prospect Cemetery as originally proposed. The idea was that if the prince planted the tree in Royce it would hasten the board of control to settle at once the purchase of the Royce park estate for a public park without further delay. This location would be much more popular than the cemetery.

YORK NEED CEMENT WALKS.
Roads and sidewalks in the township west of St. Clair at Runnymede were inspected by York council yesterday afternoon. It was decided that the wooden walks, which are in bad condition, make immediate action on the part of the council imperative. The utility of repairing the existing sidewalks was made evident to the civic authorities and it was rumored that cement walks will replace the present ones in the near future. Most of the roads are in good condition, even discounting the improvement good weather has made.

ISLINGTON ROAD DEALS COMPLETED
Members of Etobicoke council were on the warpath yesterday along the York county highway leading from Weston to Monckton. The object of the tour was the completion of arrangements for widening the roadway from 40 feet to the 66 feet demanded by the county commission before that body would take over the highway. All unfinished deals with farmers for the needed strip of 26 feet were completed and almost all fences put up. A water bound macadam road will, in the fullness of time replace the present very ordinary one.

WEST HILL FRATERNAL BICKERINGS STOPPED BY SENTENCES
Fraternal bickerings caused Geo. W. Cook to spend thirty days in prison on the invitation issued yesterday by Mayor Bruntin in the county police court. The trouble is of four months' duration, dating from the dissolution of a partnership entered into by Cook and his brother Arthur. At that time an equitable division of the partnership was made, but the partnership was impossible and periodic complaints of stealing farm implements and property have been lodged by one or the other since that time. The theft of a single cultivator brought the contestants before the bench yesterday. The magistrate stated that the only way to keep peace between the two would seem to be to sentence each to thirty days on alternate months.

Hamilton, Aug. 14.—At the annual convention of the Supreme Lodge of the Sons of England today a resolution was passed regarding the constitution of the general purpose committee, which in future will be composed of twenty elected delegates and officers of the Supreme Lodge.

BRITAIN AND PERSIA SIGN AN AGREEMENT
Paris, Aug. 14.—In connection with the proposed visit of the Shah of Persia to Europe, The Temps today says that his departure from Teheran has been hastened by feeling aroused in Teheran by the signature of an agreement with England, which in recognizing Persia's independence and integrity, seemingly will result in Great Britain being the only power to exercise influence in Persia.

The newspaper adds that British specialists will reorganize Persian finance and the Persian army and that Great Britain will advance a loan to Persia and aid Persian and British pecuniary and territorial reparations which will be of mutual benefit both to Great Britain and Persia.
