### CHURCH UNION.

Sub-Committee on Ministry Makes Some Changes in Report.

At the meeting of the church union committee yesterday, the report of the sub-committee regarding ministry was read by Dr. Cooley. Amendments have been made to last December's report, chiefly in relation of the minister to the doctrine of the church. Several questions which candidates for the ministry will be required to answer have been added. The most important of these is: "Do you believe the statement of the doctrine of the United Church to be agreeable to the teaching of the Holy Scriptures, and to your own personal faith in essential agreement therewith, and, as a minister of the church, do you pledge adherence thereto?"

It was decided to add twenty names to the general sub-committee, as follows: Presbyterians—President, R. A. Falconer, Prof. George Bryce (Winnipeg), Dr. D. M. Ramsey (Ottawa), Dr. Thomas Sedgwick (Tatamagouche, N. S.), Principal Selinger (Montreal), Prof. W. C. Murray (Halifax), Principal Magill (Halifax), and Rev. John Hay (Renfrew). Methodists—Rev. Drs. Carman, Burwash, Shaw, White, Judge J. J. MacLaren, Rev. J. T. Picher and Messrs. H. H. Puderger and J. W. Ferguson. Congregationalists—Prof. W. H. Day and Mr. H. O'Hara.

To-day the reports from all the sub-committees will be submitted.

### GRENS. ON PARADE.

First Muster of the Season—Success of Riflemen.

The first parade of the Royal Grenadiers for the fall season was held at the armories last night, with Lieut. Col. Goodham in command. Smith has been granted the colonial life award, having now completed a period of twenty years' continuous service in the ranks. At the new parade on Thursday evening the trophies won by the regimental team at Ottawa will be displayed, and the thanks of the regiment extended to the victors. The team was most successful, their shooting excellent that of all their competitors, and winning the Coates Cup, worth 100 guineas, and put up for the first time this year; the Walker Cup; Gordon Highlanders; British Challenge Shield—five prizes out of eight. They also gained third place in the Landowne Aggregate and fourth in the Dundonald competition.

STRIKING TELEGRAPHERS  
MAY ASK FOR ENQUIRY

Claim That Conditions Under Which Operators Work Are Hard on Health.

One of the local striking telegraph operators called at The World office last night and reported there was no change in the local situation. He was, however, deeply interested in the telephone report, and suggested that the government should appoint a commission to enquire into telegraphers' grievances. He said:

"The report of the telephone commission, dealing especially with the disregard of the health of employees by the company, presents an opportunity to the telegraph operators to inform the public regarding the local hours and nervous strain under which they are compelled to work. An appeal for a government enquiry may be made."

To begin with a telegrapher who is fortunate enough to obtain regular day work is on duty nine and a half hours and is under the additional strain of using their eyes, and in many instances with very poor light, owing to the rigid economy of the company. The telegrapher has a short relief of ten minutes in the morning, and punch the clock in leaving and entering the operating room so that the ten minutes cannot be exceeded without detection. They receive thirty minutes for lunch, and this allowance for eating is as uncertain as the weather in Toronto, depending upon the condition of traffic along the line.

"Another relief of ten minutes is allowed in the afternoon, and then the most aggravating abuse ever practised on overworked, tired and nervous men and women is applied. They are kept at work until a relief can be provided and owing to the shortage of telegraphers this condition prevails nearly all the time that most operators have to work fourteen or fifteen hours a day, two or three days a week, for two reasons: they need money and the company."

"The strain under which telegraphers work is much greater than that of the telephone workers, both on the nerves and the eyes. Telegraph wires swing badly at times and often become crossed, and in such cases a wire trouble the operator's brain is called upon for the additional strain of making the messages read correctly, regardless of the broken up dots and dashes."

"Telegraph operators are also imposed on in other ways by the economical policy of the company. It happens that the business varies in such a way that makes a larger force necessary at one time of the day than at another, and in other words, come to work twice a day for one day's pay. Some men work from 12 noon till 2 p.m., and return at 4 p.m., and work till 11:30 p.m., or until relieved."

"Our strike is progressing favorably and we are confident of the outcome."
